At an inquest into MacLean's death in B.C. Undertakers chapel, Const. Fred Cawdell of the Port Edward police detachment reconstructed the suicide according to his theory. It was Const. Cawdell who first saw the body after Petersen notified police. He showed the five man jury the weapon used and described MacLean's fatal wound. The bruises made it appear as if the barrel had been pressed 31/2 against the side of the head

The body was identified by James Prusky, an employee at the Dry Dock who worked with MacLean from 1941 until 1945 when the deceased terminated employment with the shinyard.

The inquest was adjourned for an indefinite period. Deputy Coroner Bruce Stevens, presiding, said today that the second witness, Peterson, was still to be heard.

Jury members were Foreman Jack Mussallem, Gunnar Anderson, George Ferguson, Peter Lacharite, William Clark and Reg Wagner.
