Discussion Of Library Matters

Views of how other libraries in the province are operated were given by C. K. Morison, superintendent of the Public Library Commission at Victoria, when he met with the Prince Rupert Public Library Board Wednesday night. He explained that in the province five city and three union libraries are operated. During the course of discussions he stressed the cultural value of a library in a community. Chairman Mrs. M. Roper presided at the meeting. Other board members present were Mrs. Basil S. Prockter, Mrs. W. S. Kergin, A. D. Ritchie, T. E. Black and Librarian Miss Mae MacDonald.

Jaycees Talk Street Signs

Geoff Hill to Attend Convention—To Meet Hydro Engineer. The matter of street signs was again discussed by Junior Chamber of Commerce Wednesday night. It was stated that a paint firm has donated one can of paint towards the venture. The city, the members were told, has not yet been delivered the lumber. A painting firm from Vancouver, it was reported, were willing to paint all street signs provided the Jaycees provide the paint and complete construction of the signs. Geoff Hill was elected as delegate to attend the National Jaycee Convention in Vancouver June 19, 20 and 21. His selection took place following a short talk by Art Lind, a member of the youth leadership committee of Vancouver Jaycees. Mr. Lind explained the agenda and entertainment to be provided by his club which will include a trip to Bowen Island by chartered steamer. The drastic power shortage during the winter here was brought to light again at the meeting. It was decided to delegate two or more members to meet the hydro engineer upon his arrival here. The move will be commended to the senior chamber. Eric Speers, chairman of the radio committee, reported that 27 broadcasts had been staged with 24 members participating.

Gyros Approve Park Program

A \$500 program for improvement to parks and playgrounds was approved by the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, on recommendation of its playground committee, at the monthly business luncheon of the club this week. Provision is made for the repairing, painting and erection of playground equipment, replacement of worn-out items, painting and repairing of bath-houses, etc., much of which work has already been carried out. Construction of a new bathhouse at estimated cost of \$1125 and a new diving board costing \$300 to \$400 had also been considered but this was deferred for this year. The club received a report from the committee on the recent Klondike night to the effect that some \$381 had been realized as a result of that effort on behalf of the playground fund. Emil Blain was offered congratulations at the luncheon on the birth of a daughter. Past President Matrice Brydges was in the chair in the absence of President A. J. Dominato who is away at Banff attending international convention. This Saturday night the Gyro Club is collaborating with the Scoutmist Club in holding a dance at the Canadian Legion Hall for Manitoba flood relief.

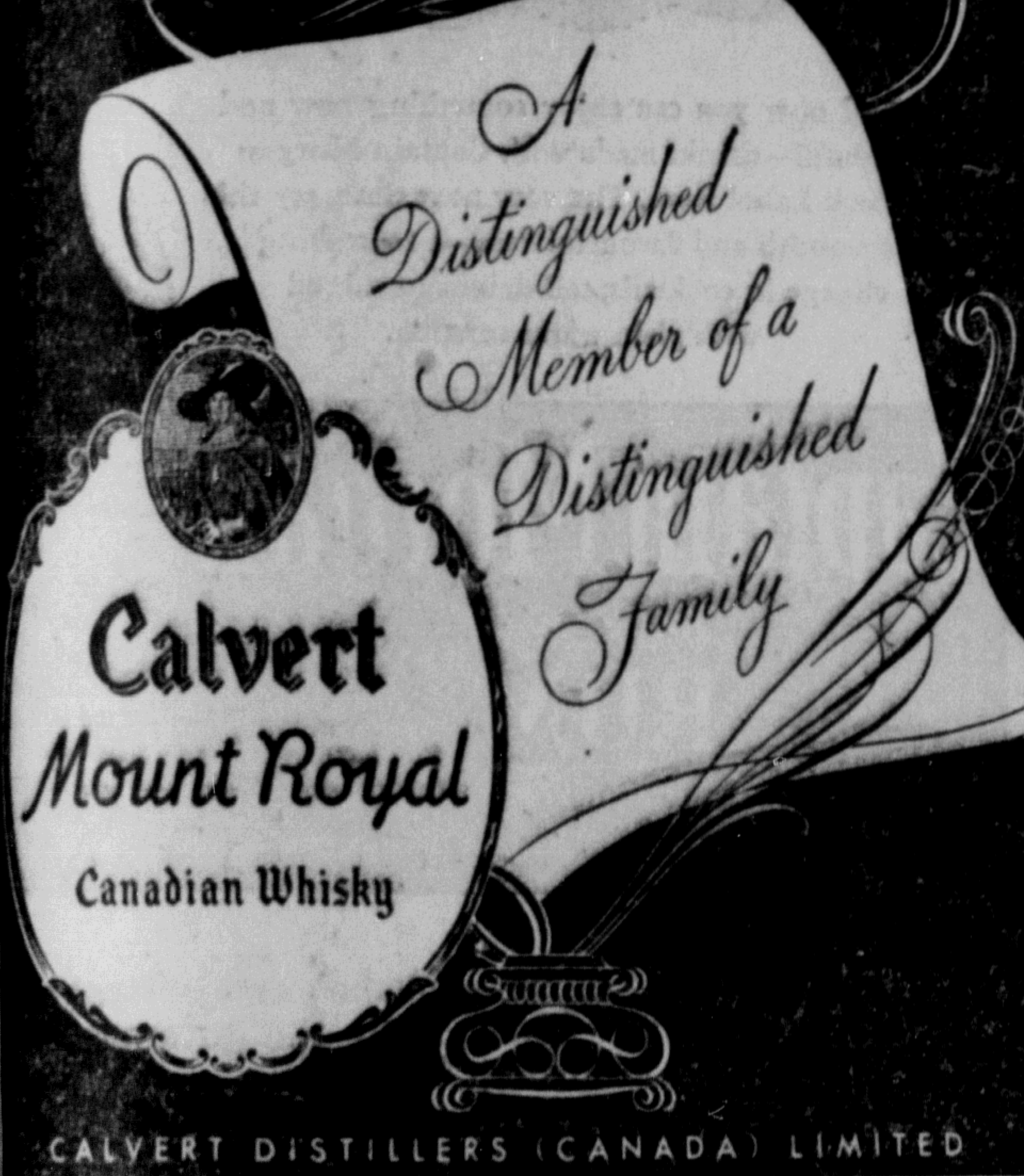

Museum Fee Criticized

It shouldn't happen even to a museum. But according to a reliable member, who said he got the information from reliable sources, two members of the Prince Rupert Museum Board hadn't gone through the museum. This information was handed to members following a question by Sid Gonick. Mr. Gonick wanted to know why the museum was charging a fee of 25 cents for admission. He said he had never stepped into museums which charged admission. Another member said, some museums have plates and a silver collection is taken. It was pointed out that the museum here is self-supporting as compared with others which are generally financed by the government. Mr. Gonick said that many tourists are "talking" after visiting the museum and being asked for 25 cents. "It's not the money," he stated, "but the principle." A recommendation was drawn up to the effect that voluntary donations be initiated and this will be forwarded to the board.
