Looking Back Reminiscences in SPORT and Records

RECORDS IN SPORT

Baseball's Hall of Fame is located in Cooperstown, New York, for enshrined there forever in the hearts of the sport-loving nation are the immortals of the American national pastime. 12 men were originally named to the Hall of Fame in 1936 and 1937. Since then, others have been added each year, every one of them a great athlete and a great competitor.

THE ORIGINAL 12 MEMBERS OF THE HALL OF FAME—ALEXANDER CARTWRIGHT, designer of the baseball diamond, and framer of the first definite rules. • MORGAN J. BULKELEY, first president of the National League. • HENRY CHADWICK, called the "Father of Baseball." • BAN JOHNSTON, first president of the American League. • A. G. SPALDING, pitcher and later baseball executive. GEORGE WRIGHT, of the Cincinnati Red Stockings, the first professional team. • CONNIE MACK, player and later manager of the Philadelphia Athletics. • JOHN J. MCGRAW, player and manager of the New York Nationals. • CHARLES A. COMISKEY, player and owner of the Chicago White Sox. • CHARLES "OLD HOSS" RABBURNE, most famous pitcher of his time. • WILLIAM "BUCK" EWING, one of the greatest catchers of all time. • WILLIAM CUMMINGS, pitcher, who originated the curve ball.

RUTH VERSUS COBB—Every sport has its rivalries and questions of supremacy. Such queries as could Louis beat Dempsey—could Byron Nelson beat Bobby Jones in his prime—will never be answered. But Ty Cobb and Babe Ruth played at the same time and their records were made during the same period. Here they are. Form your own conclusions:

RECORDS HELD BY COBB—Played most major league games; batted most times; most runs scored; most hits made; most bases stolen since 1900 (Hamilton playing with Philadelphia in 1891, stole 115 bases, but this was before the era of "modern" baseball); held the American League batting championship for 12 years, nine of them in succession; high lifetime batting average—.367.

RECORDS HELD BY RUTH—The King of Long Distance Swat; hit over 50 home runs in 4 separate seasons; 729 homers during 22 years (including world's series); earned more money in single season than any other player—\$85,000 in 1928; greatest drawing card in baseball history; most total bases in one season—457 in 1921.

Civic Centre Notes

HOME FURNISHING COURSE

March 28 is the date when Miss Eileen Cross of the University of British Columbia Extension Department will begin a two weeks Home Furnishing Course at the Civic Centre.

One group taking the course will come in the afternoons—Monday to Friday of each week—and another group taking the same course will come in the evenings. There will be the usual University Extension Department registration fee.

The subjects covered, will be the making of footstools, lamp shades, drapes, recovering smaller pieces of furniture, bleaching and refinishing of furniture and treatment of color. It is hoped on the first day of the course, to obtain a program

of the subjects to be covered on various days so those who can only come for a few times will be able to choose the subjects in which they are particularly interested.

One room will be set aside in the Civic Centre for the course so that smaller pieces of furniture may be brought down and left while they are being worked on during the course.

In a few days photographs will be on display in the Civic Centre of work done on similar courses in other places.

The Civic Centre office or Mrs. J. T. Hravey are receiving registrations and giving information.

As the hobby room is the only one that can be spared for the use of this course, the evening leathercraft classes will be cancelled for the two weeks. Formal instructions ending then and all hobby work finished for the season with the Hobby Show on April 27.
