House of Davids Rank Pros— Manager Tells About Outfit

When Prince Rupert's amateur basketball play-
ers met this week with those hairy House of Davids
it was no mean amateur concern with which they
joust. The Davids are rank professionals. They
get good pay for their services and Manager George
Anderson makes no bones about the fact that the
House of David religious sect maintains its famous
barnstorming basketball and
baseball teams for the one pur-
pose of publicizing a religious
colony which, he explains, be-
lieves in both the Old Testa-
ment and the New but holds
especially that man could be an
eternal being physically right
in this Vale of tears. Further
the House of Davids are also
strict vegetarians for they in-
terpret the sixth command-
ment—"Thou Shalt Not Kill"—
literally and they eat neither
meat nor fish.

ony also caters to tourists and
even had oil wells. It is an en-
tirely communal colony—most
of the members do not touch
money. All moneys go into a
common fund.


