MOOSE SWAMP MERCHANTS TO TAKE FIRST WIN OF BASEBALL SEASON

MOOSE 22; MERCHANTS 1

The Moose baseball team made a striking and successful effort to gain a recognizable position in the city swat league Sunday afternoon when they clouted Merchant pitchers Maundrell and Lambie into a hypnotic daze that resulted in a 22-1 victory for the lodgemen—the most lopsided score in recent baseball annals.

To the jubilant lodge brothers it was an event deserving of much rejoicing—they had finally won a game. After four barren games, the Moose goose egg had finally hatched a digit.

Credit for this feat must be pretty well distributed among the team but pitcher Jack Rosedale shares a good deal of the glory. In nine innings on the mound, he allowed seven hits,

and only one run. He struck out six batters.

There was little doubt that Moose were seriously out to win this one but then they have been out to win others too. The fans have almost become used to seeing the Moose take off in a winning mood then fold, or else start too late to catch up. This time, it was different.

The first inning saw them bring in five runs, from the first five batters, three from hits. In the third and fourth innings they garnered another four runs off Maundrell.

Lambie went on the mound in the sixth and it was indeed a sad day for the Old Campaigner. In his opening inning, the energetic Moose slapped him for five hits which matured into five runs. In the seventh he walked Vanetta who was scored by McKinnon.

The unkindest cut of all came in the eighth when Guthrie and Rosedale each blasted triples.

Four hits and a fielding error were responsible for five runs in the ninth.

Merchants' only run came in the seventh when Rosedale walked Smith who was brought home on a single by Hartwig.

Maundrell, who was withdrawn at the end of the fifth, faced 27 batters, striking out five and allowing nine hits. He walked three. Lambie in five innings allowed 12 hits, struck out five and walked two.

MOTORS TAKE NARROW WIN FROM CNRA

Motors 6; CNRA 5

Four unearned runs in the third inning, resulting from fielding errors, gave General Motors their winning break over CNRA in the city fastball fixture at Gyro Park Saturday night. The motormen emerged on the long end of a 6-5 score.

Real victim of the affray was CNRA's pitcher Lahti, who was marked as the losing hurler, despite the fact that his game record was far superior to that of Bruce Simundson, who was on the mound for General Motors.

After two mutual scoreless innings, disaster struck the railroaders when Motors capitalized on two errors by CNRA third baseman Hay and one by Tschabold. Pavlikis, Motors' catcher, singled. Simundson got on base on an error by Hay which brought Pavlikis home. Davis walked and Morgan got to first on an error by Tschabold, scoring Simundson and Davis. Windle made first on Hay's second error, which scored Morgan.

CNRA retrieved three runs

in the fifth, two off hits by Lahti and Cembella and the third from a fielder's error. Their final two were scored in the sixth.

Motors scored their winning two runs in the sixth, one off a double by Smith. Windle, who got on base as a result of an error by Vanetta, also scored.

CNRA pitcher Lahti had only one earned run scored against him, with four hits, six strikeouts and three walks.

Simundson was chalked up with three earned runs against him, and also allowed nine hits, two walks and one strikeout.
