### PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

(June 21, 1923)

Einar Beyer, prominent Alaska fish buyer visiting the city, said that "Prince Rupert is the logical shipping point for all Alaska mid-cured herring and salmon but it cannot get this trade without providing the needed facilities."

The power vessel Belmont, owned by the Belmont-Surf Inlet Gold Mining Co., struck a rock in Grenville Channel enroute from Prince Rupert to Surf Inlet. She sank, but her passengers were taken ashore in life boats.
