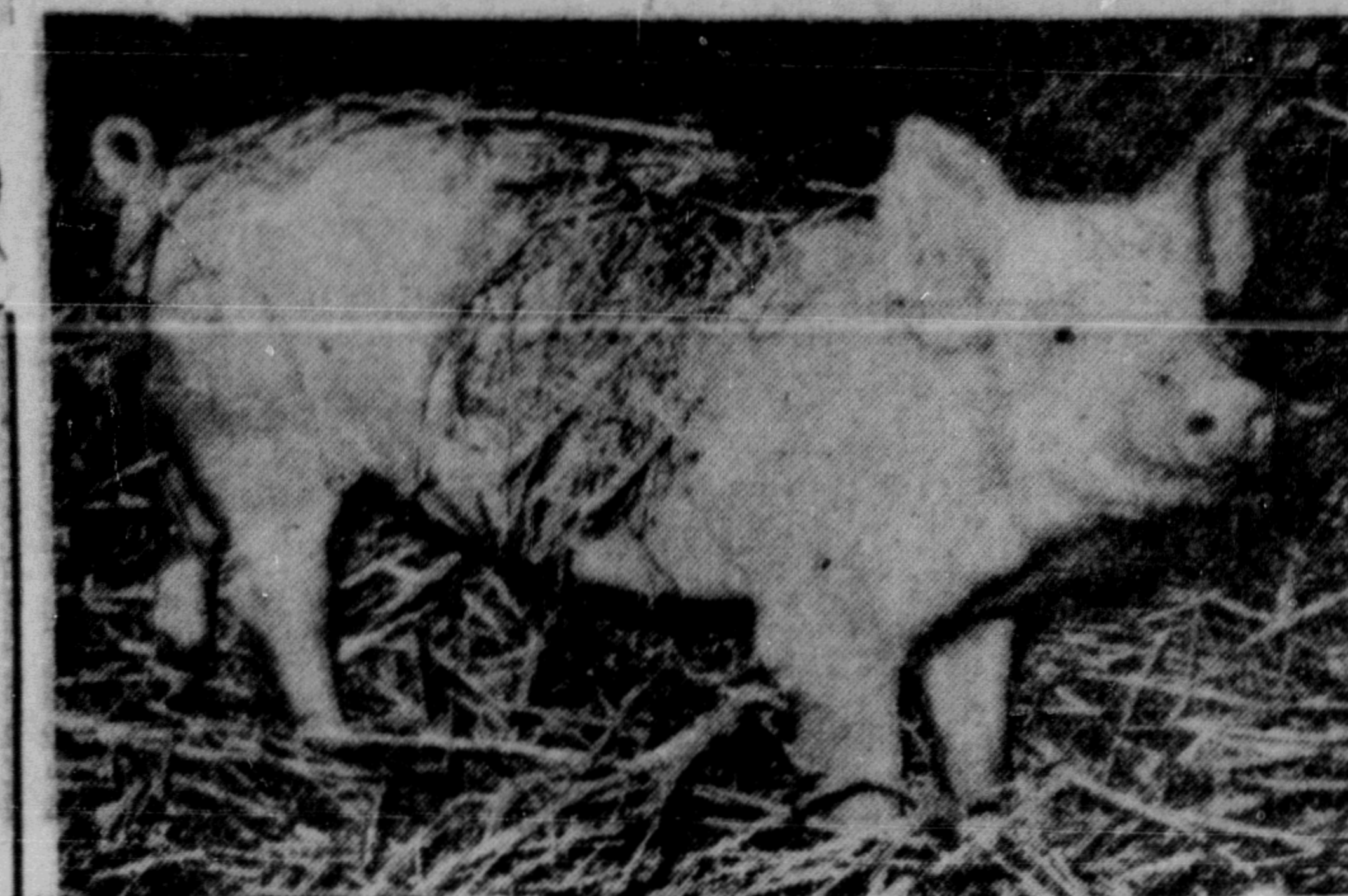

## SHIPS and WATERFRONT

Commencing early this sum-  
mer, three converted frigates  
will man the weather base 800  
miles west of Victoria. This will  
provide for more accurate weather  
forecasts. Announcement  
has been made by the deputy  
minister of transport, J. C. Les-  
sard. The ships will carry meteo-  
rological men plus crews al-  
most 100 men per vessel.

In the 1949 season, the pack  
of canned salmon in British  
Columbia was slightly above the  
average for previous years. In  
the final bulletin, officials re-  
ported that during 25 weeks of  
operation, British Columbia  
canneries turned out 1,433,723  
forty-eight pound cases of sal-  
mon. This was slightly above  
that for 1948.

By a shift in the United  
Kingdom buying program, \$20-  
000,000 will be allocated for the  
purchase of Canadian bacon  
instead of wheat. Agriculture  
Minister Gardiner, who has ac-  
cused the U.K. government of  
planning to stop Canadian  
wheat purchases, disclosed that  
the shift was originally "Can-  
ada's plan." Canada is asking  
\$29.50 a hundredweight for the  
bacon. In addition to the drop  
in wheat purchases the U.K.  
has announced it will no longer  
buy Canadian eggs, which were,  
by contract selling at 45 cents  
a dozen. As a result, on the  
Canadian market eggs have  
been dropping in price and the  
Canadian Federation of Agri-  
culture has asked the federal  
government to establish a  
floor price.

## Alex Young Passes Away

Noted Interior Barrister Dies  
In Prince George

PRINCE GEORGE. (Special to  
Daily News)—Alexander McBain  
Young, K.C., fifty-three, promi-  
nent pioneer city lawyer, died Sat-  
urday in Prince George and Dis-  
trict Hospital after a brief illness.

Although in poor health for sev-  
eral years, his sudden passing  
shocked the community.

Memorial services will be held  
in Elks Hall Thursday under aus-  
pices of Elks Lodge and Cana-  
dian Legion. The body will be  
taken to Nanaimo for burial  
alongside deceased's father, the  
late Judge F. McB. Young. His  
grandmother was first white  
child born in that city. He is  
survived by his wife, mother and  
sister, Mrs. Alexander Carmichael  
of Nanaimo.

Mr. Young, who started law  
office here in 1918, had a dis-  
tinguished record with Royal Navy  
and Fleet Air Arm and took part  
in the Zeebrugge-Ostend action  
and served in Mediterranean.  
When war broke out he tried to  
join the Flying Corps but only  
trained men were being accepted.  
He went to Los Angeles and  
learned to fly and became the  
five hundred and eighty-fifth  
licensed pilot in U.S. and Canada.

He was appointed King's Coun-  
sellor in 1942. He built up an en-  
viable record as a criminal law-  
yer in Central B. C.

Probably his most famous case  
was the successful defence of a  
man named Fredericks charged  
with murder of two friends near  
Trembleur Lake. The entire  
court was taken to the scene of  
the crime to look for bullet holes  
in trees to substantiate his client's  
story. Mr. Young found  
holes after defendant and police  
failed and this was a key factor  
in acquittal.

Born in Nanaimo, Mr. Young  
lived as a young man in Prince  
Rupert, his father having been  
County Court judge at the coast  
city for many years.
