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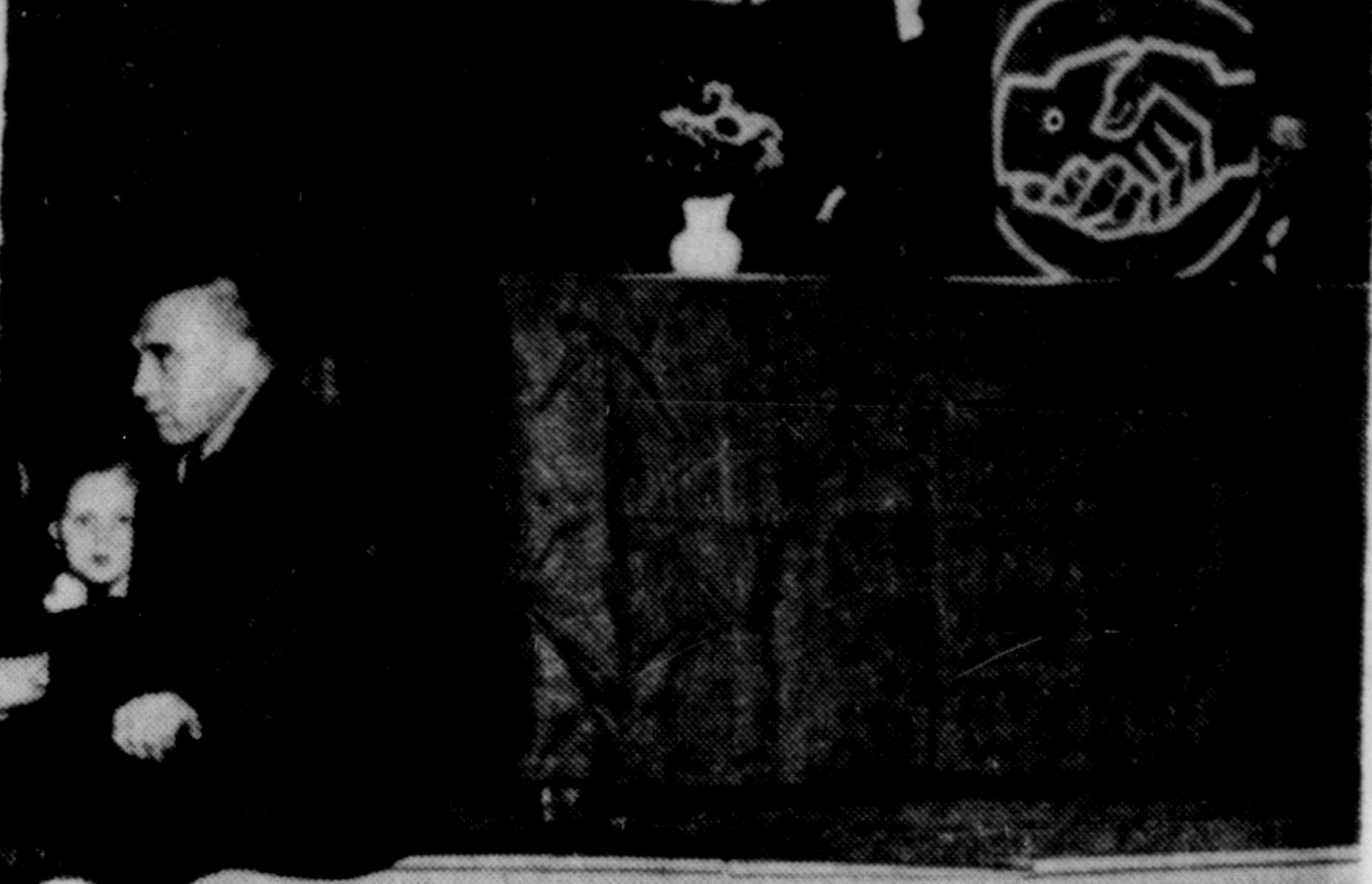

JAPAN IS CONVICTED

Found Guilty of Waging Aggressive Warfare—Tojo's Fate Deferred

TOKYO, (P)—Japan was convicted yesterday of waging aggressive war against China, Russia, Great Britain, United States and other western powers.

Conviction by an international military tribunal for the Far East came after a long trial of Former Premier Hideki Tojo and 24 co-defendants on war crimes trials.

Sir William Webb, of Australia, president of the tribunal, read a judgment which runs 1575 pages. It may be 10 days before the last defendant knows his fate.

YOUNG WOMAN FLYING WORLD

Mrs. Richard Morrow-Tait Lands in Alaska After Long Hop from Japan

TOKYO, (P)—United States Far East Air Force headquarters said yesterday that report had been received from Shemya, Alaska, that Mrs. Richard Morrow-Tait, English world flier, had landed there Wednesday after a 1,788-mile hop from Chitose, Hokkaido, the longest over-water flight for the 24-year old aviatrix and her navigator, Michael Townsend. They are attempting a world flight in a single-engine plane.

Manitoba Mayor Wins Acclamation

WINNIPEG (P)—Mayor George C. McLean, of St. Boniface, Manitoba, was re-elected by acclamation Tuesday as nominations closed for the November 12 civic elections. It marked the sixth time Mayor McLean assumed office unopposed since he was first elected in 1936.

TELLS ABOUT SUDAN MISSION

Progress of the native population of the African Sudan and adjoining areas toward a Christian way of life was depicted to an audience which gathered at the Regular Baptist Church last night by Rev. Samuel Cassels, deputation secretary of the Sudan Interior Mission, in an address illustrated with colored slides.

A veteran of four years of mission service in the Sudan and Somaliland, Mr. Cassels illustrated the transition which is taking place in the advancement of the natives from savagery to Christian civilization.

Outstanding feature of the conversion process, Mr. Cassels declared, is the enthusiasm with which the converts embrace their new faith. He told of one congregation which had outgrown its early church building and set about on its own initiative to build a larger, permanent structure.

Men in this remote centre, travelled a hundred miles on foot to the nearest transportation centre and loaded on their backs heavy sheets of galvanized iron which they carried back for the church roof.

His informative and interesting address was illustrated with colored lantern slides which showed the Sudanese in their struggle up from savagery.

G. R. S. Blackaby, leader of the Regular Baptist congregation, was chairman of the gathering and Mr. Cassels was assisted in the lantern slide display by Rev. H. Guenter, who has recently received an appointment to the Sudanese Mission.

Wednesday evening Rev. Cassels addressed a gathering at First Baptist Church, where he delivered an illustrated lecture on "A Day's Work in the Mission Field."

Tonight, he will repeat his last night's lecture at the Pentecostal Tabernacle and Saturday night he will speak at the Salvation Army Citadel. Sunday morning, he will deliver an address at First Presbyterian Church and Sunday evening at First Baptist Church.
