Waterfront - - Whiffs

Rail Strike Would Tie Up Coastal Passenger Vessels—Tuna Run Causes Stir

The national railway strike, if it comes into effect next week, will mark an almost complete tie-up of coastal passenger vessels. Canadian National Steamships announces that its steamer Prince George, due here tomorrow morning northward for Alaska, will not call southbound, as scheduled next Friday evening, if the railway strike is on. The voyage of the steamer Prince Rupert next week on the local run will be cancelled. Canadian Pacific British Columbia Coast Steamship Service announces that the railway strike would result in the tying up of its coastal fleet including the Alaska and Prince Rupert vessels. The steamer Princess Norah will be here Monday and will complete the round trip. Union Steamships Ltd. had no official announcement up to noon today as to cancellation of sailings but seemed to be preparing for such an eventuality. It has been stated, however, that freight

vessels of the Frank Waterhouse line would continue operations uninterrupted.

The advent of the tuna run off the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands stirred the local waterfront this week, sending local boats seaward with trollers, halibutters and other vessels leaving or readying to do so for the harvest. There were repeated reports of a substantial run similar to that of the late summer of 1948. First catch, 9000 pounds, was landed to the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association Wednesday by Capt. Fritz Husoy from the All Star. Other vessels are due but are, apparently, staying out to get capacity loads while the run is strong and the weather is good.

Fisheries Patrol cruiser, Howay, Capt. C. W. Earnshaw, arrived in port yesterday afternoon to take on provisions. She sails again this evening. Her main duties are protective and coast guard work.

Union ss Camosun, Capt. William McCombe, arrived in port at 7 p.m. yesterday. She sailed about 10 p.m. for the north Queen Charlotte Islands whence she returns here tomorrow southbound.

The threatened railway strike has stopped fish carriers from coming over from Alaska with fish for transshipment. Last vessel of that sort here was the Sidney Thursday morning from Ketchikan. Her cargo was kept in storage here rather than take a chance on shipping it.

Last fish to be shipped from Prince Rupert prior to the embargo which commenced Thursday night was on Tuesday night when thirteen cars of frozen fish by freight was dispatched, most of it to the United States. Now there will be no more fish shipped until a settlement in the strike dispute has been reached.

Arriving in port tomorrow morning the Canadian National liner Prince George, will have a capacity load of 260 vacationists bound for a 10-day cruise to Skagway, Alaska. One more scheduled cruise voyage here on August 29 completes the Prince George's summer sailing to Skagway.

On September 8 the Prince George leaves for a three-day cruise in coastal waters, under charter to the Washington Baby Chicks Association which is holding its annual convention

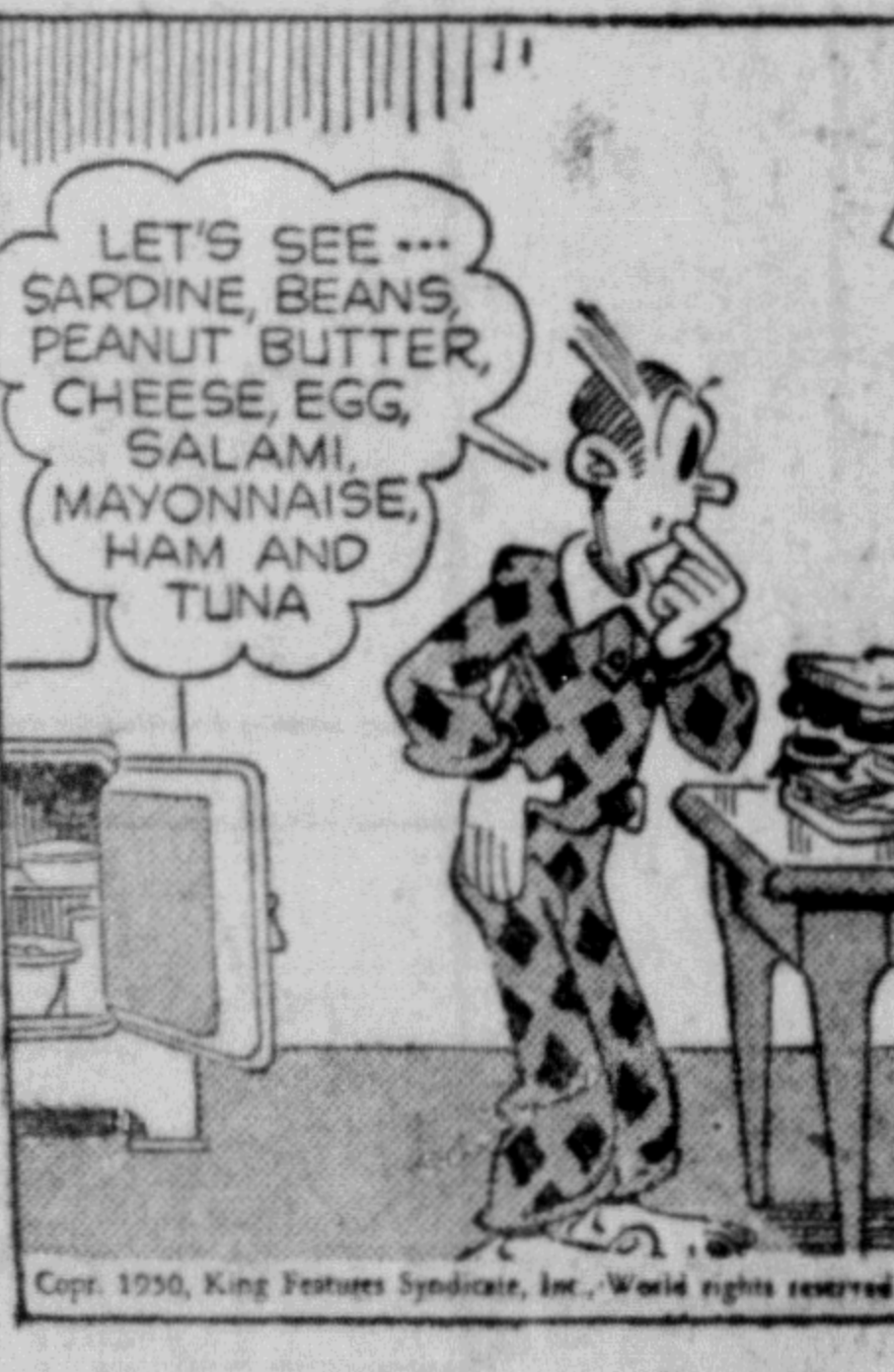

CPR steamer Princess Kathleen, Capt. G. O. Hughes, arrived in port at 9 a.m. Friday with 292 round trip passengers bound for Skagway and intermediate points. She sailed at 11 a.m. The vessel is due back next Thursday morning southbound.

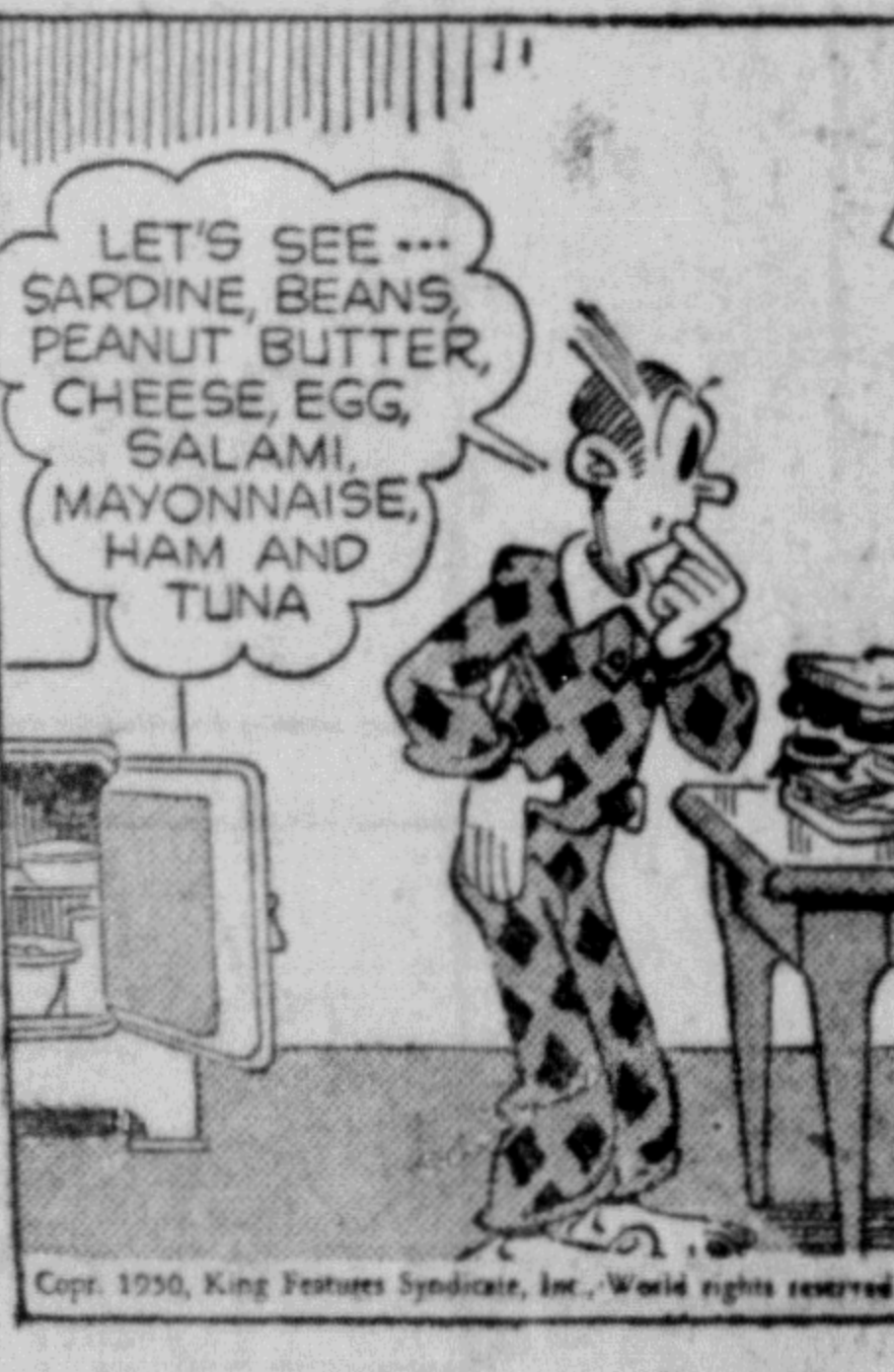

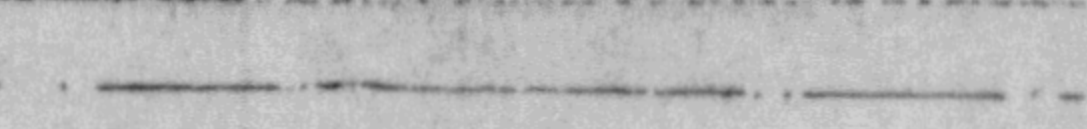
