duction have been lowered year by year. That is, production has become more and more efficient, due to the installation of better machinery and also to better "know-how." Yet the ultimate price to the consumer has gone up. Why?

ONE REASON is that costs of distribution have increased during the same period that costs of primary production have decreased.

The best paying job I ever had was as a sales manager for an electric appliance company. The machine that cost about \$25 at the factory finally got to the consumer at \$75.

We would find much the same condition all down the line. The apple grower in the Okanagan is lucky if he gets a dollar a box for the apples which we are lucky to get for \$3. And if we buy these same apples by the pound, as most housewives do, the cost per box is nearer \$5.

WHAT THE SYSTEM has done to the average young married couple is this:

Whereas only the husband had to work, say twenty or thirty years ago, now both have to do so if they want to live as well. They will live in a far smaller house, or suite. They have to do so partly because somebody has to pay for cars, etc., and partly because war, power politics, and the anarchy in the relations between nations has got us all to the point of "guns before butter."
