Figures Favor Canadians To Take Russia Tomorrow

STOCKHOLM (CP) — Can Russia, playing in an international hockey tournament for the first time, beat the Canadians at their own game?

Pending the meeting Sunday at 9 a.m. EST, between Moscow Dynamos and Toronto East York, the last two unbeaten teams in the world hockey tournament, the experts pored over the statistics of each club's six games in the eight-game round-robin series. The figures show that the Canadians have an edge—at least on paper.

SPORTS BRIEFS

ALBANY, B.C. — The underdog Albany Athletics crushed Vancouver's vaunted Eilers 72-53 here Friday night to win the opening game of their best-of-seven series for the British Columbia senior men's basketball championship. Second game will be played here Saturday.

VANCOUVER — University of British Columbia Thunderbirds upset the highly-touted Golden Bears from the University of Alberta 61-49 Friday night in the first game of a best-of-three series for the western Canada inter-collegiate basketball championship.

The second game is scheduled here Saturday night with a third, if necessary, Monday.

CHICAGO — New York Rangers last night missed a chance to move ahead of the Boston Bruins into sole possession of the fourth and last playoff berth, when they were held to a 0-0 tie by Chicago Black Hawks. The tie kept them deadlocked for fourth place with the Bruins.

DENVER — Striking for seven goals in the middle period, Denver University crumbled British Columbia 13-1 in an inter-collegiate hockey battle Friday night before 2,935 spectators.

STOCKHOLM — Switzerland and Finland played a 3-3 draw in the world ice hockey championships here today.

LONDON — The leisurely game of cricket is getting to be too slow for even the English. In an effort to rid the game of stonewall tactics, slow scoring and sloppy fielding, a group of cricket lovers plan to present star players with trophies and monetary prizes this season. Tacit approval has been given by the Marylebone Cricket Club, the "government" of the game.

VANCOUVER — Vancouver Canucks are back in a first place tie as Vancouver took Seattle Bombers 4-1 last night and Victoria Cougars booted New Westminster Royals 8-1.

DeMarco Wins Lightweight Championship

NEW YORK (AP) — It took Paddy DeMarco nine years of fighting to learn self-control, but when he did, it brought him the world lightweight championship.

Paddy, a little guy from Brooklyn supposedly on the downgrade as a boxer, won the title Friday night by decisively outpointing Jimmy Carter in 15 rugged rounds at Madison Square Garden.

It was an astounding upset in the eyes of the crowd of 5,730, which roared DeMarco in, but Paddy had a simple and logical explanation for it.

"It was my smartest fight," he said. "I held control, did what I was told, boxed and jabbed him."

Carter, usually the calm, confident fighter, apparently didn't know what to make of all this. He was counting on DeMarco to fight in his usual style—bull-like rushes and wild swinging that left him open to hard counter-punching. Paddy just didn't.

UNANIMOUS VERDICT

The upshot was that Carter, a slow starter, never could catch up and DeMarco breezed in to win the unanimous verdict from referee Ruby Goldstein and the two judges.

Goldstein's card, the closest, gave it to DeMarco 7-5, with three rounds even. Judge Harold Barnes scored nine rounds for DeMarco and six for Carter while Judge Arthur Aidala made it 9-6-1 in favor of Paddy. The Associated Press had it 10-4-1 for DeMarco.

The victory didn't bring any great financial reward for DeMarco, who at 26 has been fighting professionally for nine years. But it did bring a lot of satisfaction.

Oddly, it was DeMarco who was supposed to get the title shot when Carter won it from Ike Williams three years ago. But he was taken sick and Carter got the chance to win in an upset as surprising as his defeat.

Under contract terms, Carter will get a return bout within 90 days.
