Woman Still Owns Property In Russia

STOCKHOLM (AP)—To Mrs. Darja Aleynikova of Rostov, USSR, there never has been a Russian revolution. She owns three houses and lives by collecting rent from lodgers.

The disclosure of a capitalist rent collector still doing business 35 years after the revolution was made in the Soviet youth newspaper Komsomolskaya Pravda.

One of the things the revolution was supposed to have abolished was the holding of property by individuals. In the Communist state, only the state does so.

"How strange," said the newspaper, "to find this large chunk of commercial property in the very heart of Rostov—such a museum rarity under the very noses of the regional government."

The newspaper said Mrs. Aleynikova got by with her capitalist scheme by "loading lawyers with gifts for helping her to defend the right to own real estate."

RIGHT UP THE BROOM HANDLE

One thing you would notice when you watched Gary Thode and his Canadian school champs from Saskatoon perform, is that when each member of the team delivers a stone, he seems to throw his whole body and soul as well as his stone, right up the broom handle. The forward swing of each of these lads is a dream in motion. Their co-ordination is so finely adjusted and their delivery motion so smooth and unhurried, that their stones seem to flow from them like cream from a jug.

To achieve this has required countless hours of practice, something that each of us must be willing to devote time to if any degree of perfection is to be reached. Too many boys today want to be good at all sports. They play in all, but perfect none. Pick out one sport. Live it! Sleep it! Eat it! Dream it! And work at it if you want to be good at it. There are very few Jim Thorpes and Lionel Conachers!

Once you have reached the top of your backswing concentrate on one thing only... swinging that rock toward the broom... forget all else. The broom is your target... keep it in mind and sight. Turn the handle of the stone during your forward motion so that it is turning as it flows off the tips of your fingers.

Swing your rock ahead of the body so that when it touches the ice your right arm is stretched forward and ahead of you. Keep it behind the stone. Above all, do not set it down on the ice under your body and ride it. Keep one thing in mind—swing—swing—swing—then reach—reach—reach. Keep that right leg stretched out straight behind you and the right arm stretched out ahead of you. Don't double it up and ride out on your right knee or you will become a "pusher," for certain. Take a good look at the illustration for the right idea.

Falling for Bluff Isn't Always To Your Disadvantage

The player who absolutely refuses to be bluffed or "pushed around" is brave but, eventually, broke.

In today's deal, Mr. Dale elected to open his hand with one diamond. Mrs. Keen doubled for a take out and Mr. Masters, with a very bad hand except for his diamond help, tried to shut his opponents out of a possible major suit spot with a jump to three diamonds.

He was not successful in this, and so he ended up with a score of only 800 points on the hand. Yes, Mr. Champion refused to be bluffed. He came in with a three heart bid which Mr. Dale promptly doubled.

The opening lead was the ten of diamonds and dummy's jack was finessed, losing to the king. Mr. Masters returned his long spade. The ace won and he ruffed the spade return. He now led to Mr. Dale's ace of clubs and ruffed another spade lead.

He got out with a diamond, which dummy's ace won. Mr. Champion now played very well. He cashed the king of spades and the king of clubs, stripping Mr. Dale's hand of those suits. Next came the jack of hearts. This was ducked and Mr. Dale won with the queen.

Anything Mr. Dale returned at this point would be favorable to Mr. Champion. Actually, he led a diamond, and Mr. Champion ruffed on the board while discarding the losing club from his hand. However, he still had to lose another trump trick to the king.

"Beautiful strip and end-play—for down three," needed Mr. Dale.

Mr. Champion could have saved a trick by going up with the ace of diamonds at trick one and pounding out the ace and another trump. But of course, he is not to be bluffed. After all, Mr. Dale might have had the king of diamonds.

FAMOUS CLIPPER

LONDON (CP)—The Cutty Sark, last survivor of the famous tea clippers, will be preserved in a dry berth here in the same fashion as Nelson's "Victory" at Portsmouth. A site has tentatively been chosen on the south bank of the Thames at Greenwich.

B.C. Not Closed To Any Auto Insurance Firm

VICTORIA (CP)—Premier Bennett, whose Social Credit government is interested in lower automobile insurance, said in an interview here British Columbia is not closed to any company.

He was asked if the Saskatchewan car insurance service, which reputedly offers cheap insurance, would be permitted to operate in B.C. He said:

"Speaking on the general picture of car insurance, the field in B.C. is not closed to any company, provided it complies to the regulations, pays the required guarantee and pays the same taxes as any other firm."

A Saskatchewan government-owned insurance company, the Saskatchewan Fidelity Insurance Co., sought permission to operate in B.C. about three years ago. The application was rejected by the Coalition government then in office on the grounds that the company as a Crown corporation was exempt from Dominion income taxes, and therefore presented unfair competition to private companies in B.C.

It was claimed at the time, however, that Saskatchewan fidelity had offered to pay federal taxes on its B.C. business.

Turpin Only Interested in Title Fight

LONDON (AP)—Randy Turpin, British middleweight champion, says he will fight "any American" provided it is for the vacant world middleweight title.

But, added the British champion, "I am not interested in any offers that may come from the States to fight the winner of the Bobo Olson-Norman Hayes bout in Boston Feb. 7."

Manager George Middleton said neither he nor Turpin would make any move towards a world title fight until they had talked to promoter Jack Solomons, scheduled to visit the United States soon.
