Thousands of Points Lost by Wrong Partner Making Four No Trump Bid

When both you and your partner have good hands and are moving along toward slam, do you ever think about which one of you should bid the four no trump? Or do you just barge ahead and make that bid as soon as you sense the possibility of slam?

Thousands of points are lost by reason of the "wrong" partner bidding the four no trump. You can avoid these losses if you know how. Let's see what Mr. Champion has to say on the subject.

Against the six club contract, Mr. Dale opened the five of spades. Mr. Champion won on the board with the king. He then spread the hand, claiming 13 tricks.

THIS HOTBED KEEPS BOTH PLANTS AND GARDENER WARM

If you have a basement window facing south, a hotbed can be built around it which is most economical and convenient for the user of any.
 Using heat from the basement, which usually can spare it, it is also accessible from within, so that the operator need rarely brave wintery winds to use it.
 Use for such a hotbed can be found the year around, and the cost of construction is small, especially if you build it yourself from the complete working drawing which accompanies this discussion. Dimensions in the drawing provide for a frame covered with two standard 3 x 6 sash, but these can easily be changed to fit any size sash you prefer to use.
 Start by making an excavation in front of the window about 6 inches deep. Its area must be figured carefully, so that it will hold a frame fitted to your sash. As in the case of other hotbeds, a plastic substitute for glass may be used if preferred.

Build a frame to fit in the excavation. The sides must slant sharply from a point above the window, almost to the ground. Fit the sash on this frame, using hinges at the top so the sash may easily be raised for ventilation. Earth may be banked around the frame to keep out the cold, and the sides should be as tight as possible to keep out the wind. The frame should be caulked where it joins the foundation to prevent drafts.
 Heat is supplied to this bed by opening the basement window. The window is left open at night, and may often be closed during the day, when the sun is shining. Hotbeds of this type have been tried and tested, and although they do not maintain temperatures as high as other kinds, the heat will be more even and the ventilation much better.
 The main things to watch are temperature and drafts. Ventilation is necessary on warm days, and for very short periods on cooler days.

BC Facing Large Teacher Shortage

VANCOUVER (CP)—The President of the B.C. Teachers' Federation today predicted a shortage of 1,200 teachers in B.C. by 1955, unless enrolment in normal schools increases.

John Prior said one of the items to be discussed at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Teachers' Federation in Ottawa Jan. 24 to 26, will be a research committee to discuss how more young people can be brought into the profession.

The Federation would like to see adequate wages so more young people would take up teaching as a life's work, he said.
