Resuming the British Columbia Coast Steamship passenger service to Alaska which had been suspended for the winter, CPR steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Graham Hughes, was in port this morning from 9 to 11 o'clock bound from Vancouver to Skagway. The Princess Norah is operating on a ten-day schedule for the spring and will be joined later by the Princess Kathleen when the summer tourist run starts. There were 85 passengers arriving on the Princess Norah including eight who disembarked here. Of the Skagway passengers, thirty-five were employees of the Yukon and White Pass Route heading north for the season after spending the winter in the south. The vessel took three passengers north from here.

BASIC ENGLISH
Aids Helpful
To Immigrants

MONTREAL (CP)—Vest pocket versions of both the English and French languages are doing a lot to help integrate immigrants into Canada's way of life.

Florence Gaynor of Ottawa, consultant on immigrant education for the Canadian Citizenship Council, says that basic English and a similar form of French is proving to be an effective way of teaching the languages quickly to Canada's new citizens.

The immigrants themselves are enthusiastic about the project. An estimated 40,000 are taking courses in the simplified forms of English and French across Canada.

The emphasis of basic English is placed on a small, well-spoken vocabulary, says Miss Gaynor. Students start to speak English with the first class, and after about one year of night school—about 100 hours of classes—they are able to speak English fairly well.

Miss Gaynor now is training teachers in various parts of Canada in how to instruct basic English. The new method, she says, is not only better for the student—it is easier on the teacher.

MAKES PUPILS TALK
One class might include pupils speaking as many as 10 different languages and unable to understand each other. The teacher starts with simple words, accompanied by appropriate gestures. Her aim is to get the pupils to do the talking.

Basic English has a vocabulary of 850 words, of which 16 are verbs. Those verbs are the difficult ones for beginners... such as the verbs to be, keep, say, send. The student is launched right into them, for they are essential to English speech.

The classes are becoming so popular that immigrants of 20 years ago are starting to follow them, says Miss Gaynor. Student's range in age from five to 75 years.

The project is being supported by the federal government, which supplies free text books, through the provincial departments of education.

Southbound from Alaska to Vancouver, Frank Waterhouse freighter Cassiar, Capt. William Gleason, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning from the north and sailed at noon direct for Vancouver.
