RCMP Force Cost \$35,000 Cheaper

City council has withdrawn a resolution, endorsed at a meeting Oct. 13, to place a referendum before the public asking if they wish to retain the RCMP or establish a municipal police force.

The action was taken last night on recommendation of a report of the committee of the

The resolution was presented originally by Ald. George Casey and seconded by Ald. Darrow

Last night Ald. Gomez, armed with figures on the cost of a 16-man municipal police force based on West ancouver statistics, led the move to withdraw the referendum. The vote on a motion to with-

draw the referendum was 4-3. Aldermen Gomez, Ray McLean, Kay Smith and Bill Bremner voted for the withdrawal. Aldermen George Casey, John Currie and H. F. Glassey voted against.

In his comparison between the cost of maintaining a 16man RCMP detachment and establishing a city police force, Ald. Gomez said it would cost a minimum of \$35,000 per year more to have city police . That estimate, he said, was on wages and clothing the men alone.


