



> J. S. Burns and Dick Malcolm. in a Prince Rupert Aero Club Taylorcraft, flew eastward from Prince Rupert to Work Channel, across the Skeena river and covered both sides of Skeena river to Terrace. After refueling at Lakelse lake they went north to the east side of Kitsumkalum lake and covered valleys in that area as far north as Lava lake. They returned by the Skeena

Neeley Moore in a Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. plane, covered the Skeena river from Terrace to Woodcock and zigzagged back over triangle formed by Woodcock, Terrace and Lava lake.
