'Poison Man' Kills Coyotes In Alberta

LETHBRIDGE (CP)—Jim Archibald of Lethbridge is known to many as "the most poisonous man in Alberta." Plenty of dead coyotes would vouch for the name if they could.

Archibald, a representative of the field crops protection service for the provincial department of agriculture, has the job of killing coyotes. He's one of three men in Alberta able to use a deadly chemical known as "compound 1080."

He also helps in the province's "coyote-getter" campaign—setting cyanide cartridges which explode into the coyote's mouth when it investigates a scented lure.

Since Nov. 1, the coyote-control program has taken Archibald about 9,000 miles into remote corners of southern Alberta.

The move to eliminate part of Alberta's 200,000 coyote population started with complaints of damage from sheep and poultry farmers. In settled regions the job fell to the crop protection service.

The first action was taken two years ago with the "coyote-getter." Only trained men can set the trap because of the danger.

The site of every gun is mapped. So far unold numbers of coyotes have been killed along with a few curious dogs and two or three cows.

The coyote program with compound 1080 was started on an experimental basis last winter. Archibald has done most of the work. Results from the poison showed good protection with livestock losses cut to a minimum.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Taking a Gamble Pays Off on This Occasion

Mrs. Keen decided to go for the nine-trick game and give up her honors in hearts. Mr. Champion led his fourth best club, the five spot, and Mr. Abel played the jack. Now, the problem was how to time the play. Should Mrs. Keen win the first, second or third club lead? The contract depended on the correct solution.

Mrs. Keen let the jack hold the first trick. But she stepped in with the ace on the club return. She now cashed all five of her hearts and the ace of spades.

Mr. Champion followed to four leads of hearts and discarded a spade on the fifth lead of the suit. This left him with nothing but clubs and the one-guarded king of diamonds. Mrs. Keen then led her last club and Mr. Champion was in. After cashing three club tricks he had to lead away from his king of diamonds into the queen-ace.

Suppose Mrs. Keen had won the first club, then, as before, had cashed her hearts and the ace of spades. A following club lead could have been won by Mr. Abel and his diamond return would have meant eventual defeat of the contract.

Winning the third lead of clubs would have been just as bad, since, after cashing the hearts and the ace of spades, Mrs. Keen would have had nothing left but diamonds. In that case, Mr. Champion could have won a diamond trick and that, plus four clubs, again would have given the defenders five tricks.

The way the hand was actually played, Mrs. Keen saved a small club for an out card. She hoped, of course, that the third lead of clubs would put Mr. Champion on lead, just as it did.

But if it happened to be Mr. Abel who won the third club, that would be all right, too. In other words that would mean Mr. Abel had started with at least three clubs and therefore Mr. Champion could not have held more than four. The defenders, then, could win only three club tricks and a trick could be lost to the king of diamonds without jeopardizing the contract.
