Mrs. D. F. Baldwin, her Company leader, said Jean passed all her tests by May. She reached her 17th birthday in June.

Visiting Engineer Outlines Aims of Group at Meet Here

Steve Bentall, vice-president of the Association of Professional Engineers of B.C., outlined its aims and objects at the annual meeting here of the Prince Rupert branch.

Other guest speaker was Jack Merchant, registrar. Both are of Vancouver.

Mr. Bentall said the association was formed to protect the public interest by declaring such persons who are authorized to practice as fully qualified engineers in this province.

To become a member, an engineer must be a university graduate or have written equivalent examinations and have four years of active engineering experience.

Mr. Bentall also referred to the association's objective of uniform registration requirements across Canada. At present, each province has its own measure of qualifications necessary for membership.

The meeting was held in conjunction with a dinner at the Commodore Cafe. Neely Moore, president of the Prince Rupert branch, was chairman. Gene Bartlett is vice-president and George Van Roche, secretary.

The local branch has a membership of 25, majority of whom are engineers at Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. pulp mill.
