Safe Deposit Indication City Man Dead

It would not be natural for a fisherman to leave \$3,400 in cash in a safety deposit box for 10 years. Mr. Justice Wilson decided in Supreme Court at Vancouver.

This was what Peter Francis Tomasevich, known as Thomas did, and it was one of the reasons why William A. Schultz asked the judge to presume that Thomas is dead.

Thomas, a fisherman, was born in 1915 and went absent without leave six days after he was drafted into the Canadian Army in 1942. A sister heard from him from Prince Rupert a year later and it was learned that in 1943 he placed \$3,400 in a safety deposit box here.

As no one has heard from Thomas since or been able to find any trace of him, the judge gave his widow mother, Mrs. Dora Thomas, 2554 Trinity, Vancouver, leave to swear to his death in order that his estate, consisting only of the cash, may be closed.

Seven Cadets To be Given Chance to Fly

Of 15 members of Prince Rupert Air Cadet Squadron 559 interviewed, seven have been selected to take medical examinations as applicants for flying instruction at the Aero Club here under sponsorship of the RCAF.

Successful candidates will receive 60 hours ground school training and 30 hours flying instruction, explained Flight Lieut. Dick Garrett, squadron commander. The RCAF pays for the first 17 hours flying instruction and all ground schooling, while the Department of Transport gives candidates \$50 upon receipt of their private pilot certificate.

F/L Garrett also reported to the cadet sponsoring committee that new-type cadet uniforms had been received and issued to all but three cadets.

The following committees and chairman were appointed by Cadet League chairman Fred Adames:

Finance, Jack Laurie; accommodations, Gordon Reid; public relations and publicity, John Magor; entertainment, Doug Hogarth; membership, Jim Taylor; squadron staff, Archie Gordon; cadet enrollment, F. E. Anfield.

Plans were discussed concerning observance of Air Cadet Week and RCAF Amalgamation Day. Church parades and a tag day have been organized, as well as a party for cadets, with tentative date set for April 10.

Next meeting of the committee will be April 9.

Radar on Ships Not Compulsory Says Chevrier

OTTAWA (CP)—Transport Minister Chevrier says Canada will not make radar compulsory on ships until such a move is recommended by organization experts on safety of life at sea.

He made the statement before the Commons gave second reading—approval in principle—to a bill extending compulsory use of radio telephone and telegraph equipment on ships. The measure already has been approved by the Senate.

Howard Green (PC—Vancouver-Quadra) noted there was no mention in the bill of radar.

Mr. Chevrier said a great deal is known about radio telephones and telegraphy but the same cannot be said about radar. It was a new device. It was a good aid to navigation which the government placed on all its ships.

The government encouraged officers and crews to take courses in radar. However, radar would not be included in the Canada Shipping Act until it is recommended by safety-at-sea organizations.

Last year Canadian women working in Red Cross workrooms used \$165,341 worth of materials to make 769 cases of clothing—valued at many times that amount—for shipment to ten different countries and to the League of Red Cross Societies.
