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## Future of U.S. Tennis

NEW YORK—What's going to happen when the United States Davis Cup team is selected next year? If Frank Shields still is captain, will he go along with Dick Savitt?

Those and other questions were making the rounds among tennis officials today as delegates to the annual United States Lawn Tennis Association's annual meeting scattered to the four corners of the country.

Shields' unprecedented blast at Savitt, one of the country's top players, whom the captain accused of bringing discredit to the entire game of tennis, brought a prompt reply from Dick who is defending his Australian championship in Adelaide.

"I thought Frank was a pretty good captain," said Savitt, obviously upset by Shields' remarks. "I was a bit disappointed at not being named to the team, but I did not think he thought all the things he said. I don't think I ever have been a detriment to tennis."

When Savitt's name came up for discussion as the No. 1 player in the country, Shields rose before the gathering and said:

"I would not like to see Savitt ranked No. 1. I have been with him the last three months, and never once did he look like America's top player. Furthermore, I think that his sounding off after the Davis Cup matches has brought discredit to the entire game of tennis."

That undoubtedly ended Savitt's chance as far as the No. 1 ranking was concerned, even though ex-national champion Don McNeill said that personalities should not be injected.

In Australia, Savitt said he felt the newspapers had built up his "sounding off." Asked about not looking like a champion, he said: "I don't know how a champion is supposed to look."

The net result was that Vic Seixas of Philadelphia was given the No. 1 ranking, with Savitt No. 2 and Tony Trabert of Cincinnati No. 3. The original rankings as submitted last December had Trabert first, Seixas second and Savitt third.

Meanwhile, in Melbourne, Aussie Cup Capt. Harry Hopman got into the argument in favor of Savitt.

Hopman, a tennis writer for the Melbourne Herald, wrote that the reasons advanced by Shields against a No. 1 ranking for Savitt are weak. He wrote:

"If he wished to do so, Savitt could point a finger at Shields and say, 'He is the main reason why I did not play at my top form during the three months he mentions.'"

"From the moment the American Cup team arrived in Sydney, Shields ordered Jack Kramer to direct a training schedule of running, calisthenics and skipping which was quite foreign to the preparation and training Savitt had followed to achieve his Wimbledon and Australian titles.

"Savitt objected . . . but was told to 'continue or else.' . . . Kramer himself was crippled from it."

With Savitt unquestionably one of the top players in the country, he is essential for Davis Cup competition. He's going to get better before he gets worse and the record shows he has beaten Australian ace Frank Sedgman.

What Shields will do is anyone's guess. Perhaps by the time this year's cup team is selected, he will have made up with Savitt. There also is a possibility that Shields won't get the job again, or if he is offered it, will turn it down.

Whatever happens, it's a job with enough problems to last the rest of the year.

## CANADIAN "BONUS BABY"

## One Goal in Two Games

Habitants Beat Rangers and Creep up on Maple Leafs

MONTREAL (CP)—Goalies had the whiphand in National Hockey League action Thursday night with two games producing only one goal between them.

Montreal Canadiens nipped the New York Rangers 1 to 0 while Boston Bruins and Chicago Black Hawks played to a scoreless tie.

Maurice Richard, back in action after a six-game layoff due to groin injury, scored the only goal—his twenty-fifth of the season. The Rocket was obviously off form but he made the most of a big opportunity midway through the final period.

The Montreal victory puts the Canadiens only half a game behind the second place Toronto Maple Leafs.

Boston took over undisputed fourth place by their 0-0 tie before 3,218 fans, an all-time low attendance for hockey in Chicago.

Closest approach to a goal in this game came not long after the half-way point in the third period. Woody Dumart's rap past goalie Harry Lumley was disallowed because the rookie defence man, Jack McIntyre, was in the crease when it occurred.

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## Harlem Globe Trotters in Basketball World Series

NEW YORK.—Basketball's most spectacular production—the coast-to-coast "World Series" between the 1952 College All-Stars and the Harlem Globetrotters—will start March 30, A. M. (Abe) Saperstein, owner-coach of the Trotters, has announced. (The Globetrotters have played twice in Prince Rupert.)

The series will open at Madison Square Garden in New York and will be played in 15 cities in as many days, ending in Indianapolis April 13.

Now in its third year, the series, which drew nearly 400,000 fans in its first two seasons, is expected to attract some 250,000 spectators. The Globetrotters won the inaugural series in 1950, 11 games to seven, and bettered that mark with a 14-4 record in 1951.

Clair Bee of Long Island University, who coached the All-Stars the past two years, will direct the collegians again. The makeup of the All-Stars will be announced at the close of the college basketball seasons.

Saperstein also announced an ambitious world tour for his Globetrotters starting immediately at the conclusion of the World Series. The Trotters will play 165 games on this

tour which will hit practically every corner of the earth.

The tour will include 38 games in South America, six in the British Isles, 61 in other European countries, six in North Africa, 10 in the Near East, 10 in Australia, 10 in the Philippines, 14 in Japan and China, and 10 in the Hawaiian Islands. The last game will be played in Guam, Oct. 5.

## Vancouver Looks For PR Boxers

Hopes Contenders for Golden Gloves Will Go Again

VANCOUVER (Special to Daily News)—Big plans are being mapped for the 1952 Daily Province Golden Gloves which will be held here March 7 and 8.

Already officials are meeting regularly to set up committees to organize the show, the biggest amateur boxing spectacle in B.C. every year.

This year, the Province show will mean a lot more to every fighter who enters the tournament, because 1952 is Olympic Year. And a fighter's record in shows like the Province Golden Gloves mean a great deal when the Olympic team is selected.

Incidentally, the impression made by last year's boxing contingent from Prince Rupert has not been forgotten in Vancouver. Many boxing enthusiasts are still talking about the quartet of Rupert boxers—particularly "Mouse" Morrison. Last year, when Morrison won the middleweight crown, beating Lon Bianco of the Vancouver Active Club, it climaxed one of the biggest fights of the Golden Gloves.

"We hope to see some of those Prince Rupert boys again, this year," one official said. "They were good."

## St. Louis Gets Many Night Games

ST. LOUIS.—Club owner Bill Veeck announced the St. Louis Browns have scheduled 41 night contests for Sportsman's Park during the 1952 season—the most night games ever scheduled by the Browns at home.

The name-game schedule includes eight contests with the Washington Senators, seven with the Detroit Tigers, six with the Philadelphia Athletics and five with each of the other American League members.

The rival St. Louis Cardinals of the National League announced a 55-game night schedule last week.
