U.S. to Buy 120 Million Pounds Of Nickel Per Month From Inco

COPPER CLIFF—The International Nickel Company of Canada, Limited, announced today it has signed a contract under which the United States Government has purchased for

quick delivery a total of 120,000,000 pounds of metallic nickel and 100,000,000 pounds of electrolytic copper.

The contract is with the Defense Materials Procurement Agency (DMPA).

Deliveries will start this December. They are made feasible, according to Dr. John F. Thompson, chairman of the board of Inco, as a result of an entirely new project in the Sudbury District of Ontario which permits additional production of 2,000,000 pounds per month over Inco's current peak nickel production capacity.

This, he said, is made possible through completion in recent months of certain mining and metallurgical developments maximizing years of planning and research, and of the rapid advance in the company's underground mining expansion program toward which it has devoted the major part of its \$150,000,000 capital expenditures made with its own funds since early in World War II.

Deliveries under the contract will be at the rate of 2,000,000 pounds per month for metallic nickel and 1,666,666 pounds per month for electrolytic copper. These deliveries, to start in December, are scheduled to be completed in 1958, coinciding approximately with the time when according to published announcements new nickel production capacity of others now under development may be expected to come into full operation.

Cruise Travel Sets Record

NEW YORK—A new post war high in cruise travel was reported today by Holland-America Line.

Company officials said the 6,063 passenger total on 11 cruises to South America and the West Indies between December and April was the highest in post war years and the largest for one company in the 1952-53 season. It was almost 50 per cent larger than the 4,466 total for Holland-America cruise ships in 1951-52.

On their first visit to Canada, Michael Bates and Douglas Campbell, members of the Stratford, Ontario, Festival cast from England, are impressed with Canadian scenery, efficiency and weather. They will be taking part in both Festival presentations, "Richard III" and "All's Well That Ends Well," in Stratford this summer.

Michael Bates, formerly of the Memorial Theatre in Stratford, England, is well known there for his flair for comedy and ability as a character actor. Not yet out of his twenties, he will take the part of elderly men in both plays. Since leaving the Memorial Theatre last November he has been appearing on television and radio in London.

Douglas Campbell, young Scots actor, son-in-law of Sybil Thorndyke, has played for nearly three years with the Old Vic company and has distinguished himself in a variety of parts, including the title roles of "Othello" and "Julius Caesar." Last year he toured with the Old Vic company in South Africa and has played major roles in the Old Vic Theatre's plays this season. Since appearing in their last production, "Murder in the Cathedral," and before coming to Canada, he played in the televised version of Ibsen's "The Lady from the Sea" over BBC.

The Canadian League of Composers has announced it is willing to underwrite and sponsor at least one concert of Canadian music at the Stratford Shakespearean Festival.

Considering that so large a part of the audience will be international, the League feels that the occasion is important enough to warrant the allocation of its funds in order to present Canadian music in this setting.

Details of the concert are not settled, but Louis Applebaum, Canadian composer and musician who is music director of the festival and vice-president of the Canadian League of Composers, said today several leading Canadian artists are interested in participating in the event.

Final arrangements for an orchestral concert of Canadian music at Carnegie Hall in New York City have been completed by a steering committee headed by Carl Haverlin, President of BMI Canada Limited, and of Broadcast Music Inc., and Kenneth Sobel, President of Station CHML, Hamilton, Ontario.

Leopold Stokowski will conduct his own recording symphony orchestra for the concert, on Friday night, October 16.

All Canadian composers and publishers are now being invited to submit works for consideration of a selection committee. Musicians invited to join this group include: Sir Ernest MacMillan, Edward Johnson, Claude Champagne, Wilfred Pelletier, Walter Piston, Aaron Copland, William Schuman, Roy Harris and Henry Cowell.

Commenting on the selection committee, Mr. Sobel said: "The scope of this group and its creation result from a desire to examine thoroughly the great storehouse of Canadian music we know to exist."

Kitsilano Boys' Band Leaves On Three-month U.K. Tour

The Kitsilano Boys' Band of Vancouver and its conductor and founder, Arthur Delamont, were among almost 900 passengers sailing from Quebec Wednesday in the 20,000-ton Cunard liner Samaria.

They are en route to the United Kingdom for a three-month, seven-day-a-week, two-shows-a-day musical tour.

Comprising 40 teen-aged boys, the band has played in nine cities and towns since it left Vancouver May 21. The Samaria's sailing will mark the fifth crossing of the Atlantic for members of this group of young musical ambassadors.

A foursome of "volunteer mothers" is accompanying the band on its travels abroad. They are: Mrs. Arthur Delamont, Mrs. A. J. Wood, Mrs. Bert Emery and Mrs. D. MacKinnon. The band sailed in the Samaria in 1950 also.

Through private donations, \$23,000 was raised to pay for the tour. For the first time, this year all appearances overseas will be in theatres save for some Sunday recitals which will be given in parks. In the larger cities the boys will live in hotels but when they tour the provinces they expect to stay in private homes.

CCF Would Seize Alcan, Breweries

DUNCAN — A Socialist government in B.C. would take over the B.C. Electric, the breweries, and "in time" the \$550,000,000 Alcan project at Kitimat, CCF leader Arnold Webster said here Wednesday. The new leader, making his first Vancouver Island appearance in the campaign, before 100 persons, outlined industries slated for seizure in reply to questions.

NOTE: When this headline appeared British Columbia was shocked. The leader of the Socialists then announced that Alcan would not be taken over provided it "lived up to its social obligations." But the Regina Manifesto of the CCF to which the B.C. party subscribes, says: "No CCF Government will rest content until it has eradicated capitalism and put into operation the full programme of socialized planning..." The CCF official programme is to take over "natural resources and the principal means of production and distribution."

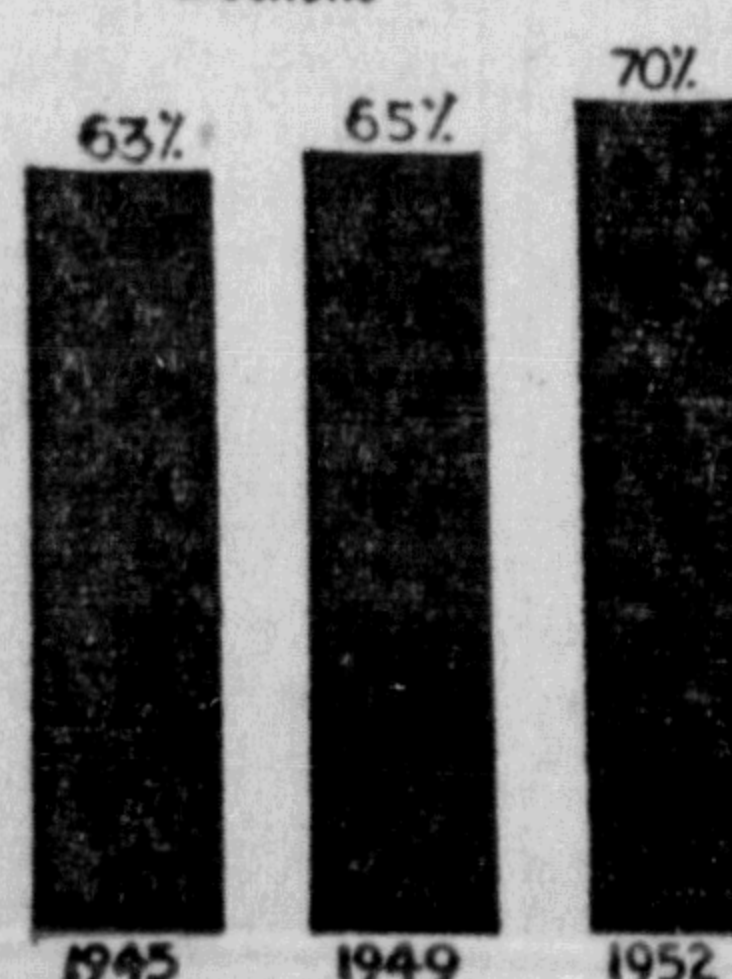

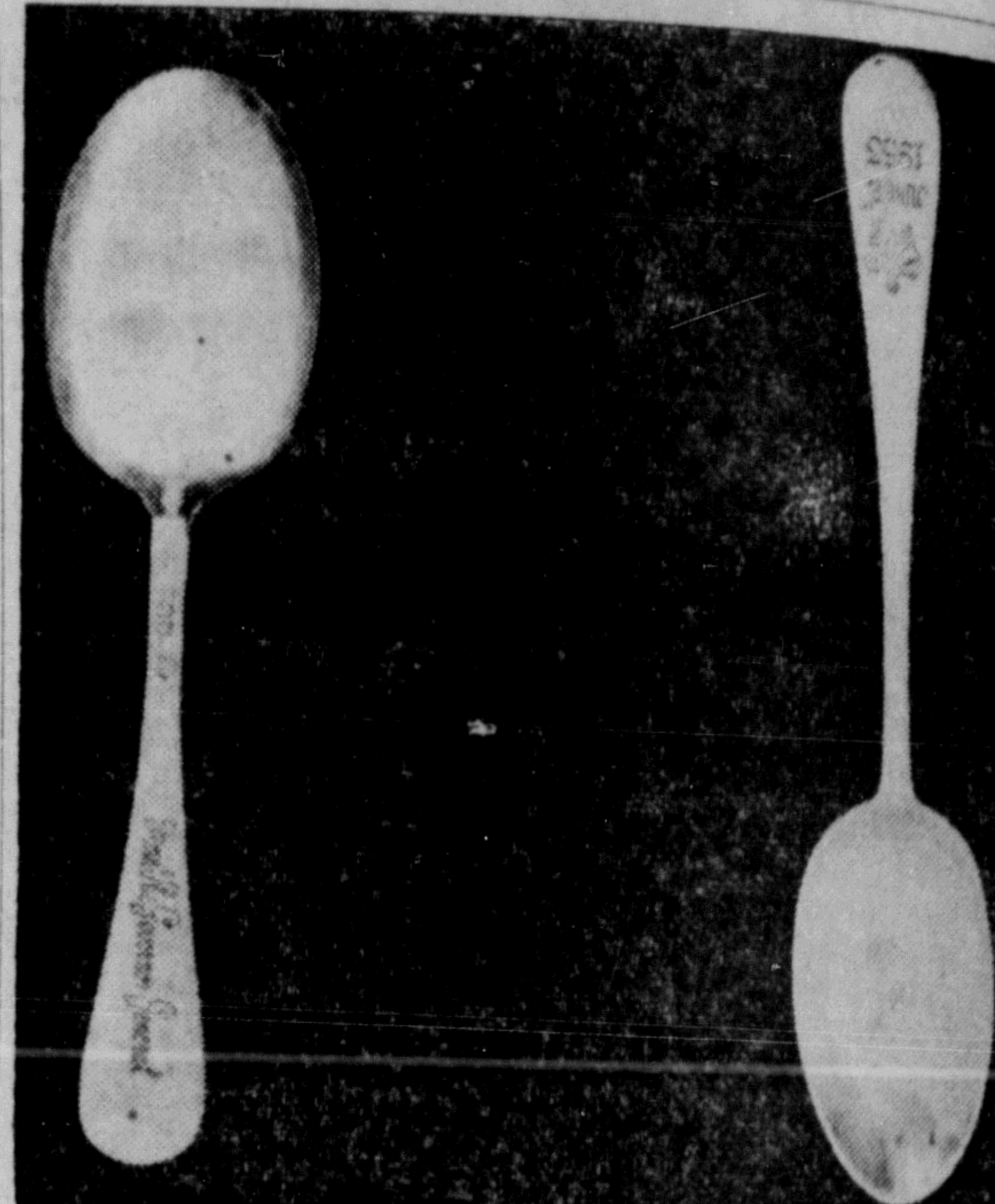
