Frogman Misses Boat

SEATTLE (AP)—A Wisconsin dairy hand who said he was anxious to fight in Korea, donned a "frogman" outfit and swam out into Elliot Bay here searching for a Korea-bound transport he could board.

But Francis A. Wagner, 23, of Milwaukee, was forced from the bay after 45 minutes by the coldness of the water and leaks in his suit. As he climbed out at the port of embarkation he was spotted by a civilian guard and turned over to police.

"I'm not a stunt man," he protested later.

"I've tried to re-enlist in the army, but they won't take me. I thought that if I could get on a troopship I could mix with the other men and get to the front lines in Korea and convince the army that I can be a good soldier."

He said he had served in both the army and navy and received discharges for reasons he said he brought on himself.

His "Frogman" outfit, bought from war surplus stores here, police said, consisted of waterproof trousers, taped on at the waist; rubber "flippers" on his feet; a bathing cap, face mask and a sweat shirt. He had smeared two pounds of lard over his chest and arms.

He had inflated a rubber inner tube which he pushed in front of him and on it floated a duffle bag, with provisions for 24 to 48 hours and dry clothing and shoes. He also had a grappling hook he said he planned to use to board a ship, a trench knife and a bolo knife. He lost his flashlight when it sank.

"But my pants began to leak," he told officers. "My legs got numb and I knew I would have to get out or the water."

Police held him without charge for questioning and military authorities also talked with him.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

You May Have To Sacrifice
Extra Trick to Good Timing

In timing the play of a hand properly, it is sometimes necessary to give up the chance of making an extra trick. In today's deal, Mr. Masters got the king of clubs opening and he won with the ace. There was only one card in his hand which was the correct lead at trick two. Which would you have led?

The general situation illustrated in this hand occurs fairly frequently - and therefore it might be helpful to follow the reasoning of a player like Mr. Masters.

One line of play was to go over to dummy with a heart to the king and return the jack of spades for a finesse. If Mr. Abel held the king of spades, 11 tricks could be taken. In other words, the defenders would win only a club and the ace of diamonds. The losing heart in the South hand could be discarded on dummy's diamonds.

But, following this same line, suppose Mr. Meek had the king of spades. He would win with that card, cash a club and lead a second round of hearts, knocking out dummy's last heart stopper. In this case, the defenders would have a heart winner set up while they still had the ace of diamonds and Mr. Masters would be down one.

He was not at all interested in winning only nine tricks on the hand. He was only slightly more interested in taking 11 tricks. His prime interest was in making sure he took 10.

With that objective in mind he laid down the ace of spades at trick two. Mr. Meek won the second spade lead, cashed a club, then led a heart. But now Mr. Masters had time to pick up the remaining trump, knock out the ace of diamonds and enter dummy with the second heart honor to reach the good diamonds and park his losing heart.
