National Loop Boosts Total

NEW YORK (P-The National League released its 1954 baseball schedule today, which listed a record number of 239 night games and unprecedented single games for two clubs on the U.S. Decoration and Labor Day holi-

Every team in the league except Chicago Cubs, which has no lights, increased its archlight output. Last year the circuit scheduled 220 night games, which tied the all-time mark set in 1951.

St. Louis Cardinals again have more floodlight contests scheduled than any other club, 53. That's two more than last year.

Philadelphia has scheduled 48 archlight tilts, six more than in '53. Milwaukee has 33, one more than last season; Cincinnati 32, four more; Pittsburgh 28, one more; Brooklyn 26, two more and New York 19, three

more. The season starts April 13 and for the first time in 61 years Pittsburgh Pirates will open at home. Philadelphia will be the opposition. In other opening day pairings. Brooklyn is at New York, Chicago at St. Louis and Milwaukee at Cincinnati.

In what is believed to be the first time single games have been scheduled on Decoration Ray (May 31) and Labor Day (Sept. 6). Brooklyn is at Philadelphia for one game on the former date and St. Louis at Cincinnati for a single on the

latter. The regular season closes Sept. 26 with Pittsburgh at Brooklyn, New York at Philadelphia, Cincinnati at Chicago and St. Louis at Milwaukee.

Toronto in Second Slot With 4-2 Win Over Habs

There was a new look around the National Hockey League today and indications that playoff forecasters may be crossed up before the 70-game schedule ends next month.

Toronto Maple Leafs, the team coach King Clancy said would come along late but strong, are in second place and New York Rangers are still showing signs of overhauling Boston Bruins for the last playoff berth in the race for the Stanley Cup.

Many fans figured the Leafs were a cinch to make the playoffs but few expected them to knock the powerful Montreal Canadiens out of second place. They did it Thursday night by beating Canadiens 4-2 in Mont-

Meanwhile, the Rangers, virtually counted out of the running until they brought up veteran Doug Bentley to go with their youngsters, came from behind to beat Chicago Black Hawks 3-2 in Chicago. The victory left Rangers only one point behind the Bruins, beaten 5-0 by the league-leading Red Wings in Detroit

The victory gave the Red Wings 67 points, nine more than the Leafs. The Rangers have 47, one behind the Bruins.


