

Braves Win Over Dodgers But Lose Big Argument

The Brooklyn Dodger ball park, graveyard of many National League pennant hopes last season, is proving surprisingly friendly to Charlie Grimm's Milwaukee Braves.

They won six of 11 games there last year. Their 1954 edition is trying to do the job even better.

Milwaukee invaded Brooklyn last night for the first time this season and walked off with a 2-0 triumph. However, they lost one of the most prolonged arguments of the season. A seventh-inning drive by Eddie Mathews

bounced off a railing atop the centrefield fence and fell back on the field.

Umpire Bill Engelin ruled it a double. Umpire Bill Stewart called it a home run and waved Mathews in. The Dodgers screamed. The four umpires huddled. The Braves screamed. But in the end Mathews was sent back to second. Despite the ruling, the drive scored Danny O'Connell from first base with Milwaukee's second run.

Elsewhere in the National League New York Giants defeated Cincinnati 5-4 and Philadelphia Phils edged Chicago Cubs 9-7 in 10 innings. The St. Louis Pirates game at Pittsburgh was rained out.

In the American League, Joe Coleman of Baltimore allowed his former Philadelphia teammates only two hits, both singles, as the Orioles beat the Athletics 2-0. New York Yankees defeated Cleveland 5-3, Chicago White Sox shaded Boston 2-1 and Washington beat Detroit 5-3.

The Giants beat Fred Baczewski for the first time in his career. The Cincinnati left-hander had whipped the New Yorkers five times running.

After falling to runs behind in the eighth because of poor defensive play, the Phils rallied to tie the Cubs in the eighth and won in the 10th as Del Ennis singled home Richie Ashburn.

A double by Yogi Berra with two on and two out drove home the runs the Yankees needed to beat Cleveland for the first time this season. Indians had won three in a row.

Bob Keegan won his fourth game against a single loss and scored the winning run for the White Sox against Boston after he tripled in the seventh.

Detroit used four hits, including a homer by Frank House, to score three runs in the first four innings against the Senators, but Bob Porterfield slammed the door as he finished with 5½ hitless innings. Porterfield homered in the ninth after breaking run in the eighth.

Stamps, Aces Resume Tonight

CALGARY — Calgary Stampede and Quebec Aces meet tonight in the fifth game of the best-of-nine series for the Edinburg Trophy, and the contest looks as a big one for both clubs.

Stampede, enjoying a 3-1 edge in games, could move within one game of the silverware with a victory tonight.

Sixth game will be played here Thursday night with the seventh contest, if necessary, at Edmonton Saturday night.

Aces, after dropping the opener by an 8-1 count, showed promise of making a real fight of it when they took the second game 2-1 to tie the series 1-1. Then in the third game, they were edged 6-5 in a contest that could have gone either way, and dropped the fourth 7-4 Monday night.

WEST'S JUNIOR CUP HOPES DWINDLE AS TEEPEES WIN

TORONTO — Western Memorial Cup hopes dwindled today as the east rested with considerable confidence after taking a two-game lead in the best-of-seven series for the Canadian junior hockey championship.

St. Catharines Teepees last night defeated Edmonton Oil Kings 5-3 in a fast-skating, hard-checking game.

But Tuesday night's story was a different one from Sunday, when Teepees walloped the Kings 8-2 in easy fashion. Coach Ken McAuley of Edmonton was more convinced that his team will not fold in the minimum of games.

"The boys played a lot better," he said, "and they can play better than that."

Spokane, Vancouver Replace Salem, Victoria as Leaders

Spokane and Vancouver clobbered lower bracket opponents Tuesday night and wound up tied in first place in the Western International Baseball League.

Spokane handed Tri-City its 11th loss in 14 starts, 9-6, and Vancouver upended Wenatchee 13-10. That left them knotted in first place, half a game in front of the pack.

The Salem Senators and Victoria Tyees, who had been virtually tied for the lead prior to Tuesday night's game, both lost, Salem bowing to Lewiston 6-5 and Victoria dropping a tough one at Yakima, 3-0.

Edmonton and Calgary were idle.

Spokane scored seven runs in the first inning at Kennewick and coasted home with its eighth win in 13 contests. Charley Raddock and John Bossmar carried the big sticks for the Indians.

Raddock homered in the second and Bossmar circled the bases in the eighth. Tri-City used four pitchers trying to halt the Indians. Bossmar's homer was off Jess Dobernic, the third Tri-City hurler. It was the fifth

four-master given up by Dobernic in 10½ innings.

A ninth-inning rally good for five runs kept Vancouver in the win column. Ten men batted for the Capitanos in the big inning before Charley Klein, who relieved Charley Oubre, managed to retire the side.

Victoria's Bill Bottler and Yakima's John Carmichael hooked up in a tight pitching duel at Yakima, allowing only three hits apiece. The Bears got theirs in the first inning, and aided by a pair of walks and a fielding error, converted them into the winning tallies. Carmichael's struck out seven and walked two. Bottler had five strikeouts but issued eight passes.

A walk and two hits in the ninth inning brought in the winning run as Lewiston handed Salem its first home loss of the season. Catcher Ed Garay, who had walked, scored after singles by Joe Bache and Clint Cameron. Salem manager Harvey Storey homered with a man aboard in the fifth inning.

Wenatchee reported the signing of southpaw hurler Larry Richardson, a former Chicago White Sox bonus baby. Richardson, said to have received \$40,000 from the Sox after starring in Wenatchee high school and American Legion baseball, signed with the Chiefs after drawing an outright release from the Sox' farm organization. Richardson had been playing for Tri-City on option from Chicago.

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At present Shamrocks hold last playoff berth in A League, but hold only a two-point lead over Whalen's Lucky Six and Hi-Jackers. Mixups hold sixth spot in B League, leading Bob Parker Limited by only one point.

In A League, Fowle and Ruttle's Sadie Downing took double honors last week, rolling 308 for high single and 694 for high three. Art Olson of Shenton's and Jack Sedgewick of Whalen's tied for men's high single with 298, while Don Hartwig of Shenton's took high three honors with 750. Shenton's captured team high single and high three with 1300 and 3785 points.

In B League, Marie Richards of Harold's took high single with 263 and Joan Parks of Bob Parker Limited took high three with 649. High man was Don Hawryluk of Esquire Men's Wear who rolled 283. Men's high three was taken with 622 points rolled by Bill Hardy of Hill's Shoe Store. Harold's 1300 points took team high single and their 3413 took the high three honors.

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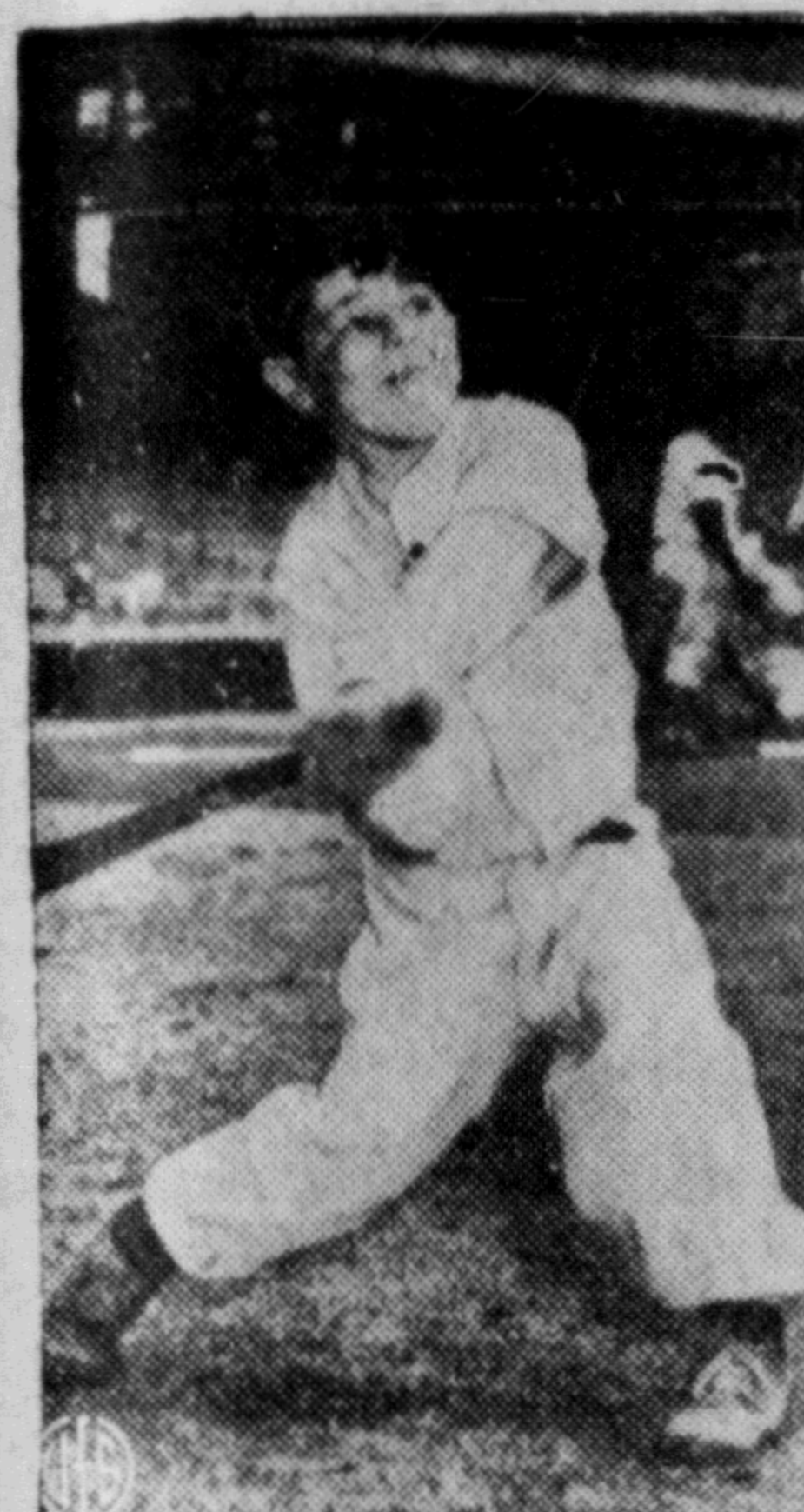

Seattle weathered 4-hit pitching and survived a home run barrage Tuesday night to edge Portland 5-4 in their first 1954 Pacific Coast League encounter.

The win boosted Rainiers into a sixth place tie with Portland, three games out of first place, and gave them a 1-0 edge in the seven game series at Seattle.

In the first inning Ray Orteig unloaded a four-bagger for Seattle with Nany Fernandez and Al Zarilla on base.

Rocky Krsnich slapped a homer for Portland in the second, with none on. Fletcher Robbe socked another with Walt Judnich on base in the third and Joe Rossi, the Port catcher, knocked one in the same inning.

In Hollywood, Bobby Bragan's Stars humbled the power-laden Oaks 7-3.

San Diego, figured as a pennant contender, ran into Sac-

ramento, and was shut out by the league's leading pitcher, Marino Pieretti, notched an 8-0 decision.

The victory installed the Stars in first place in the standings and dropped Oakland a full game behind, with Hollywood only a half game behind the Oaks.

Elmer Singleton held Los Angeles to seven hits and recorded San Francisco's first shutout of the season, 7-0.

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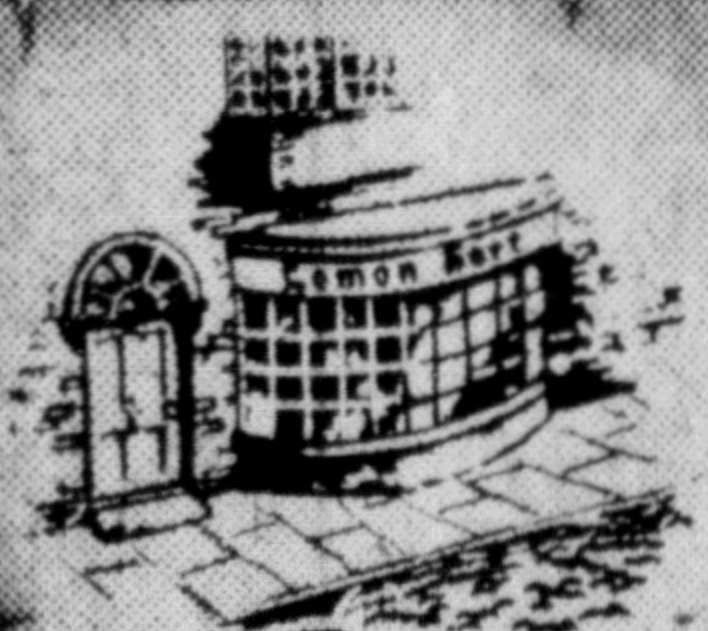
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
