VANCOUVER (CP)—United States skiers swept the senior men's races while Canadians took honors in junior and women's divisions at the Canadian slalom skiing championships on nearby Grouse Mountain Friday. Deway Davidson of Portland University won the senior slalom championship, finishing the course in one minute, 45 seconds. Roland DeFlyffer of Summerland became the new Canadian junior slalom champion with a time of 2:35.7. Alfred Eakin of Burns Lake was second at 2:11.2. The new Canadian women's slalom champion is June McKenzie of Rossland. She finished the same course in 2:02.3.
