Timely RECIPES

Salmon Tamale Pie

1 cup yellow corn meal
2 cups boiling water
2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons butter or margarine
1 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup oil
1 (10 1/2-ounce) can tomato soup
1/2 cup chili powder
1/2 cup salt
Dash cayenne pepper
2 cups canned or cooked salmon
1/2 cup ripe olives
1 cup grated American cheese

Bring corn meal slowly into boiling water, and cook over heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Set over hot and continue cooking 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add butter, and cool slightly. Add onion slowly in oil until browned. Add soup and seasonings and heat thoroughly. Remove skin and bones, and flake fish. Cut olives from pits into small pieces. Stir fish and olives into soup mixture. Remove from heat and add 2/3 cup cheese. Bake in 1 1/2 quart casserole with corn meal mush. Fill with salmon mixture and top with remaining corn meal mush and cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) about 30 minutes. Serves 5 to 6.

Flags Up for Accession Day

Marking the accession to the throne of Queen Elizabeth II as Her Majesty returned to London today from her interrupted tour, ensign at HMCS Chatham was hoisted close up at noon today and there it remains until sunset. Tomorrow the flag will be unfurled again at half-staff, continuing thus until the conclusion of the period of mourning for the late King George VI.

Other flags in the city followed similar procedure today.

As HMCS Chatham observed formal acclamation of Queen Elizabeth II at noon, ship's company turned out to stand at attention while the Navy Ensign was hoisted to top from half-mast position.

Lt. Noel Langham, staff officer, was in charge of the ceremony.
