West Braces for Molotov's New 'Security' Proposal

BERLIN (AP)—Western delegates to the Berlin conference appeared agreed today that Foreign Minister Molotov's promised "new proposal" on European security is almost certain to be just another propaganda attack on Western defenses against communism. However, they promised serious consideration of any genuine proposal which Molotov might put forward at today's Big Four session.

Senator Says Pledge 'Violated'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator John C. Stennis (Dem. Miss.) contended today that the Eisenhower administration violated a pledge by sending 200 United States Air Force mechanics into Indo-China before consulting key congressmen. Stennis, a member of the Senate armed services committee, said in an interview that he favors immediate recall of the U.S. mechanics as a move to avoid possible direct involvement in the long anti-Communist war there.

Declaring that "I'm no isolationist," Stennis said he believes a majority of his Senate committee opposed sending the mechanics into Indo-China. He himself favored increased U.S. aid in money and equipment to the anti-Communist forces.

Senator Harry F. Byrd (Dem. Va.), in a separate interview, called it a "risky step" to send the mechanics. He, too, said members of the committee were not informed in advance, and that they were told the plan by Admiral Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, at a secret session Friday.

MORE TECHNICIANS SENT
That followed publication of newspaper accounts saying 125 or more technicians had been sent.

Byrd said the next steps would be requests by the French for U.S. pilots and ground forces in Indo-China, and added that he would oppose that. Defence Secretary Charles E. Wilson told a press conference Tuesday that the fighting is going satisfactorily, and that he sees no need to step up U.S. aid.

Wilson said Tuesday that unless the Red Chinese intervene or some similar new factor enters the picture, he thinks chances are good for a military victory in the seven-year-old war the French and native forces have been fighting.

State Secretary Dulles, Foreign Minister Bideault and Foreign Secretary Eden met at Dulles' house at noon to co-ordinate their strategy. About the most they could do in advance of Molotov's move, however, was to agree that they would not engage in any repetition of old arguments with him but would take a careful look at anything new he might offer.

After the meeting, the three Western statesmen joined the Austrian foreign minister, Leopold Figl, and other members of the six-man Austrian group he brought here Tuesday to appeal for quick conclusion of Austria's long-delayed independence treaty.

The Austrian problem now is scheduled to come up Friday. Tuesday, as he had done before, Molotov referred to the European Defence Community treaty as a divisive force covering only six powers, West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, Luxembourg and The Netherlands, and leaving other European countries out in the cold. He contended EDC was "a preparation for war" against Russia.

Economic Activity At New High

OTTAWA (CP)—Governor Graham Towers of the Bank of Canada said today that Canada's economic activity soared to an all-time high in 1953 but showed "levelling-off" signs toward the year-end.

The stockpile of unsold goods in stores and on farms began to climb during 1953. Spending by governments increased slightly, but the rise was a fraction of the jump in the previous year. Employment toward the end of the year did not keep pace with the annual increase in the labor force.

In all, however, Canada had a prosperous year. National production showed a 3 1/2 per cent rise in volume to a peak of \$24,200,000,000. Mr. Towers said in a 22-page annual report tabled in the Commons by Finance Minister Abbott.

Consumer spending reached a new high of \$15,000,000,000, up \$700,000,000, from \$14,300,000,000 in 1952.

BANK LOAN DEMAND

He made these other points:
1. Demand for bank loans was "particularly strong" during 1953 in connection with the rise in inventories and instalment buying by consumers.
2. Total assets by Canada's chartered banks rose to \$8,534,000,000, up \$491,000,000 from \$8,043,000,000 in the previous year.
3. The Bank of Canada, the government's banking agency, showed a net profit of \$4,092,807 in 1953.
4. Canada savings bond sales almost tripled in 1953 to \$900,000,000, compared to \$341,000,000 in 1952.

SYDNEY, Australia (CP)—Complete equipment has been assembled for the new South Wales department of agriculture's project for the artificial insemination of queen bees. The project at the Glenfield Veterinary Research Station 30 miles from here is the first experiment of its kind in Australia.

Russians Disclose New System Of Waterproofing

MOSCOW (AP)—The Russians have come up with a waterproof system they call "hydrofobizatsion." It's so good, they say, it'll even keep tissue paper dry in a rainstorm and permit you to carry a quart of loose milk home in a paper bag.

The discoveries were reported in the newspaper Leningrad Pravda. Scientists at Leningrad University are credited with developing the process. No details are given except to say the chemicals used are of a silicious organic character which are cheap and can be produced in large quantities. The paper claims this is an entirely new waterproofing method. It says that where rubber "mechanically keeps water out, hydrofobizatsion prevents the molecular ties between water and fabric and treated fabric therefore repels water."

This means you could throw your raincoat and rubbers away if you had a suit and shoes treated with the stuff. Paper cups no longer will have to be waxed, water colors can be washed after treatment, and "even the cheapest cottons will repel water as if they were made of rubber," the newspaper says. The article goes on to say that treated and untreated fabrics are indistinguishable in appearance. The chemical cannot be removed from the fabric either by boiling or chemical detergents.

Building materials, ceramics and glass all can be treated—even auto windshields which, when hydrofobized, do not get wet, the paper claims. Leningrad University researchers, the article concludes, now are looking for a way to hydrofobize metals.

BERLIN (Reuters)—Half of East Germany's teachers fled to the West between 1945 and 1953, West Berlin officials said today. More than 80,000 had fled, compared with 81,000 teachers left in East Germany, the officials said.
