BLACKWOOD on BRIDGE

 Best Player Often Not Best Partner

Mr. Dale is not the best player in the world in a technical sense, but he is just about the best partner. Mr. Champion will make obscure squeezes and communication plays which the old boy may miss, but that sort of technical excellence will pay off only on two or three hands in a session.

Mr. Dale's partnership tactics pay off on more than half of the hands dealt. He always makes his partner feel at ease, which is the condition in which anyone plays his best game. He never tries to grab all the glory. He tries to think of the 26 defensive cards as a single unit and is constantly looking for a way to promote tricks in his partner's hand.

In today's deal if he had tried to beat the three-no-trump contract all by himself he would have taken exactly four tricks. The way he played it, he won only three tricks in his own hand, but he made it possible for Mr. Abel to take two.

The opening lead was the six of diamonds. Mrs. Keen saw that her best chance was to play for the diamond suit to block so she went right up with dummy's ace. But Mr. Dale got out of the way. He played the jack.

Mrs. Keen then led a club and Mr. Dale ducked, the queen winning. Next came a heart finesse and he won with the king and cashed the king of diamonds. Now, because he had the trick of diamonds left instead of the jack, he was able to lead through Mrs. Keen's 10 up to his partner's queen-nine. Thus the defenders won three diamonds, a heart and a club, for down one.

At the first trick Mr. Dale realized that his partner was extremely weak and the only face card he could reasonably

be expected to hold was the queen of diamonds. There was the added thought that if Mrs. Keen had held that card she almost certainly would have let the first trick run to her hand. Note that if Mr. Dale had played the trick of diamonds on the first trick, his side would have won only two tricks in the suit. He could have cashed the king and jack after getting in with the king of hearts, but Mr. Abel could not have afforded to over-take the jack with his queen as that would have set up Mrs. Keen's 10.
