## Canned Pack of Fruit, Vegetables Over 300 Million Cases Since 1920

HAMILTON — Canada's food and vegetable canning industry has packed more than 300 million cases of canned fruits and vegetables since 1920.

From small beginnings prior to the turn of the century, fruit and vegetable canning has grown to its present importance with more than 470 canneries throughout the country and an annual product value of more than \$150,000,000.

Story of the rise of the Dominion's canning industry to this prominent position and the many benefits it provides the nation's workers, farmers and businessmen is traced by the American Can Company, which for 50 years has been supplying metal containers to the industry.

Fruit and vegetable canning got its start in Canada at Grimsby, Ontario, in 1879. Early pack records are not available but census figures show that by 1901 there were 55 fruit and vegetable canneries in the Dominion with an annual product value of \$2,831,742.

Output was limited because up to the first decade of the 1900's packers used old-style cans. Fruits and vegetables had to be cut up and stuffed through small holes in the tops of the cans which were then capped and soldered.

The 1951 packs of 14,361,700 cases of vegetables and 4,356,500 cases of fruit pushed the 32-year combined pack to well over 300 million cases — not counting a substantial amount of canned meats, milk, soups, fish, infant food and other products.

Tabulation of all 1952 packs has not been completed.

### Brodie Twins Still Living But in Danger

CHICAGO (AP)—The Brodie Slamese twins are nearing the end of their first month as separate individuals, but their chances for survival still is a big medical question mark.

Rodney Dee, the stronger, is responding well after two plastic procedures to build a skin cover over his exposed brain. However, about a quarter of his brain top still is bare and he will remain on the critical list until it is completely covered and the danger of infection is removed.

Roger Lee has been unconscious since the 15-month-old head-joined twins were separated Dec. 17. Doctors are amazed that he continues to live.

Doctors found only one membranous brain cover and one main brain drainage vein serving both twins and they gave them to Rodney in the separation operation because he was the stronger.

Roger's entire brain top is unprotected by living tissue, but a plastic cap is serving as a substitute.

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### Alberta Man Urges PGE Use Monkman Pass

VANCOUVER—A rail link between Prince George and the Peace River country should "most logically" run through Monkman Pass, a member of the Grande Prairie, Alta. Board of Trade said here.

Fred Johnson claims the route would be shorter than one through Pine Pass, less expensive and snow-free.

Mr. Johnson, who took Ralph Chetwynd, British Columbia railways minister, through the Monkman pass route in August, was discussing the minister's announcement that the route is being considered for an extension of the province-owned Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

The PGE would connect with the Northern Alberta Railway at Beaverlodge, Alta.

Mr. Chetwynd's announcement that the route is being studied—no decision has been reached—brought protests from political and business men in Dawson Creek.

Mr. Johnson said: "To those who may argue that a PGE line through Pine Pass would in effect be a rail link with Beaverlodge, my argument would be that there is nothing to develop along the Pine pass route."

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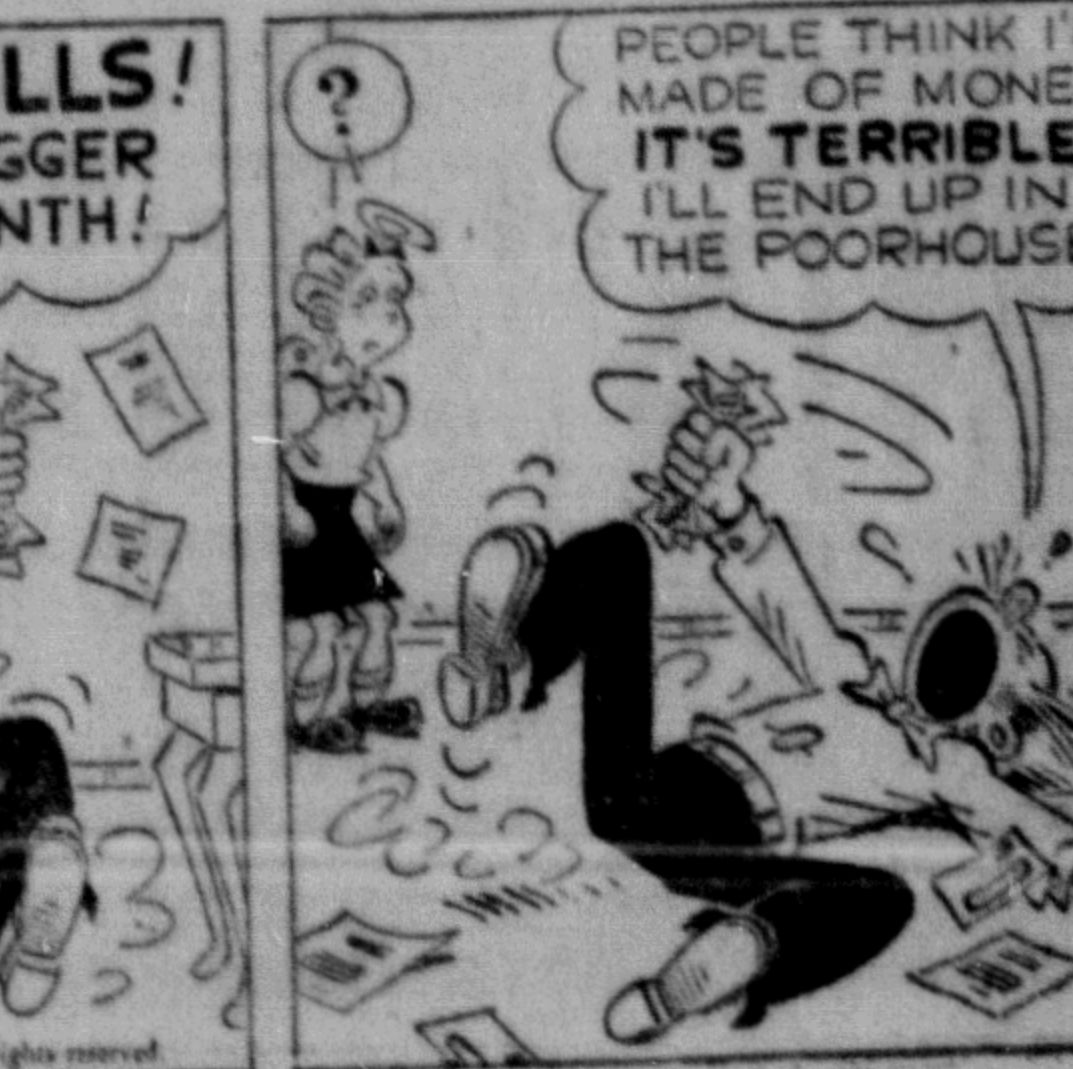
