



THE TRUTH is of course that Canada had to sign the Japanese peace treaty on the American time table. Things had to be rushed through to suit the urgencies of U.S. power politics. So Canada could not even delay the mad scramble long enough to get written into the peace treaty a provision saying:

"Japan will keep in Japan the 150 persons born in Canada but who served in the Japanese armed forces against Canada in the Second World War: and Japan will keep her fishermen in the western half of the Pacific Ocean if Canada will keep her fishermen in the eastern half."


