

"Little Uns" Make Good In World of Sport

LONDON (CP)—A group of "shorties" has combined this summer to punch holes in the old athletic adage that a good big man—or woman—can beat a little one every time.

A contributor to the cause has been Canada's Marlene Stewart, the five-foot-tall, freckle-faced golf powerhouse from Fonthill, Ont., who became the first Canadian ever to win the British Women's Open Amateur Golf Championship.

Her ice-cool concentration and flawless game marked her down for comparison with short-statured Ben Hogan.

Hogan arrived on the scene a little later and made the golf-wise Scots realize that everything that's been said about the big-hearted little Texan is true, as he tore one of their toughest courses to pieces and won the British Golf Championship in his first attempt.

The trend has been established in other fields, too.

Lindsey Hassett, a five-foot, five-inch Australian who leads the invading test cricket team, is

more than getting by. Across the courts, Maureen Little Mo Connolly was winning the women's singles again. The California basher, five feet, four inches in her tennis socks, wasn't fazed by her taller opposition.

Stan Matthews, 38, who won the Football Association Cup for Blackpool this year played the game of his life against Bolton Wanderers in the final.

The summer has been kind, too, to Sir Gordon Richards who, at four feet, six inches, seems the smallest of the lot.

Sir Gordon was knighted this year for his contribution to the sport of kings, continued at an age when most men, big and little, have retired. Sir Gordon also won the Derby for the first time, after years of trying.

Surveying the situation, John Hall remarked in the Daily Mail that the situation may dampen the enthusiasm of government-employed scientists who have just reported that the average Briton is growing taller.

The sportsmen and women who come and conquer, he said, actually "are the little 'uns."

Local All-Stars Win International Series

Prince Rupert All Stars treated the home town fans to three games of heads-up baseball over the week-end as they took two games straight to win the four-C. Bass, 3b game total point international series by one run from Ketchikan and win an evening exhibition game to boot.

When the game continued Sunday afternoon Cameron pitched two innings only giving up one hit but was tiring. Grey took over in the top of the 12th and disposed of Ketchikan 1-2-3. A single by Sunberg, a fielder's choice, a sacrifice and a wild pitch saw Sunberg score.

In the second game Freddy Christensen gave up one run to Ketchikan in the first inning and then held them scoreless as Prince Rupert went ahead in the first inning and were never threatened. Sunberg collected three of the hometown hits, two of them doubles.

In the exhibition game last night Jamie Grey from Terrace held Ketchikan to six scattered hits and kept the Americans scoreless until Hughes banded out a double, stole third and was brought home when veteran Harry Ludwigion bunted safely.

White Sox Miss Chance To Gain on Idle Yanks

Once again Chicago White Sox are moaning "Monday Blues" after missing a chance to take full advantage of a week-end stumble by the New York Yankees.

Walt Masterson of Washington was the stumbling block Sunday, shutting out the White Sox with six hits, 1-10, while

rain washed out the Yanks' doubleheader with St. Louis Browns. So the White Sox still trail New York by five full games in the American League.

Cleveland closed to within seven games of the Yanks by grabbing a pair from Philadelphia, 10-1 and 7-1, on pitching of Bob Lemon and Early Winn.

Detroit knocked off Boston twice, 2-1 and 9-6, extending the Red Sox losing streak to eight games.

Brooklyn's lead was cut half a game to 7½ when the Dodgers were beaten by St. Louis, 10-1, while second-place Milwaukee broke even with Philadelphia, 4-1 and 6-1.

Cincinnati swept a pair from the stumbling New York Giants, 5-0 and 3-1. Chicago finally downed Pittsburgh, 7-6, in 10 innings on Ransom Jackson's home run.

The Indians showed lots of spark as they came to life in the closing innings of their game with Tyees and pounded out an 8-4 decision.

Vancouver split a twin bill with Lewiston, winning the opener, 5-4, and dropping the nightcap, 11-7, and Yakima divided a pair with Tri-City, taking the first, 4-0, and losing the afterpiece, 6-3. Calgary and Edmonton were not scheduled.

In games Saturday night, Edmonton two-timed Calgary, 13-5 and 4-3; Victoria and Spokane split, Victoria taking the first, 6-5, and the Indians the second, 8-6; Salem whipped Wenatchee, 8-4, and Vancouver lubbed Lewiston, 6-3.
