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Young Canada's Book Week

A ARS. HUGH JOHN FLEMMING, a former / VI British Columbian who is married to the premier of New Brunswick, has some wise words to say in connection with Young Canada's Book Week, of which she is patroness this year.

"Our most experienced educators keep reminding us that we can't dispose of harmful books merely by trying to ban them," she remarks. "We must provide satisfying substitutes in the form of attractive, good books to inspire and delight young minds."

In these few words Mrs. Flemming has picked out the weakness in the case of those self-appointed censors who would abolish this, that and the other thing from children's reading but have no alternative to offer.

Censorship which merely deletes is never effective. If children are being provided with offensive literature, there is no point in simply removing it from circulation. Something else of equal or more appeal to them has to take its place.

This is one of the purposes of Young Canada's Book Week which the country is now observing. It is a period in which parents, teachers and all others connected with children's activities are asked to make special efforts to interest the young in the treasure-house of fact and imagination found at the local library. In Prince Rupert, a contest to quicken youthful powers of observation and criticism is part of this worthwhile endeavor to turn children's attention to good reading.

As one writer has said, "The pleasant books of childhood cross all the frontiers." No child should be denied the chance to make such a fascinating trip.

What Price Security?

A NOTABLE conversion of thought for society's / problems has been registered by J. B. Priestly, British novelist and playwright. At one time Mr. Priestly considered that security was one of man's great rights. Now he asks:

"What relation to their work have the happiest men you know? Women and children need security; but do men, real men? How many persons whom you respect prefer minimum hours of work and plenty of passive amusement to the chance of working like blazes making something? Is our society becoming more flexible or less-and if you think more, have you tried starting anything good lately? Are there more rich, fiery, independent characters about? Are men's deepest needs being increasingly satisfied?"

They are questions more easily asked than answered, but they are worth asking all the same.
