Wainwright Chosen Site For Training

OTTAWA (CP)—A Canadian brigade of some 6,500 men will be trained at the big military training camp at Wainwright, Alta., as Korea replacement troops—but not all at once.

A defence spokesman said the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade replacement group will go through training at Wainwright a few units at a time. Three battalions plus ancillary troops will be trained in time for Korean rotation late this year.

The 1st Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment and the 1st Battalion of the Royal 22nd Regiment in Korea are due for rotation shortly. The replacement battalions, which trained at Valcartier and Petawawa, will be en route to Korea within two months.

The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry battalion in Korea, third unit in Canada's 25th Brigade, was recently rotated.

Members of the Women's Royal Australian Army Corps are part of the regular army.

Contact With Culture Lost To Majority of Canadians

BOWNESS, Alta. (CP)—Sculptor Luke Lindoe of Bowness says Canadian culture is suffering from hardening of the arteries and he has decided to seek a new approach to art.

Lindoe, 39, is renowned throughout the prairies for his fine ceramics and watercolors. He contends the "mission of art" which existed in previous eras has expired.

"The only art that has its feet soundly on the ground today is architecture," he says. "Other visual arts are the last remnant of the renaissance rather than an obvious beginning of tomorrow's art."

CPR to Rebuild Pier Ruined In '38 Fire

VANCOUVER (CP)—More than \$29,000,000 will be spent by the Canadian Pacific Railway for improvements to British Columbia services this year.

Building projects included in a \$12,000,000 appropriation include a specially-designed rail-car ferry for the Vancouver-Nanaimo service; preliminary work on reconstruction of pier "D" in Vancouver; new rail and ship terminals at Nanaimo and Vancouver; and extensive rail improvements.

In addition, the CPR will spend \$17,000,000 to buy new diesel units.

Architects are designing a 7,000-ton vessel for the rail-car ferry service, which will be the largest in the company's coast fleet.

About \$2,000,000 has been set aside for berthing facilities for the ship at Vancouver and Nanaimo.

Preliminary work on reconstruction of pier "D," destroyed by fire in 1938, will cost \$300,000.

The company has ordered 71 diesel locomotive units for its Kettle Valley-Kootenay line.

About 119 miles of rail replacement and the replacement will cost almost \$3,300,000. A 315-foot wooden trestle in the Comihalla Pass will be replaced with a steel bridge.

Plans have also been completed for a \$300,000 artificial ice plant at Penticton to produce 100 tons of ice daily for passenger equipment and refrigeration.

Rea to Seek TV Station In Edmonton

VANCOUVER (CP)—Bill Rea, owner-manager of radio station CKNW, New Westminster, said Thursday he will apply to Ottawa Feb. 27 for permission to build a television station in Edmonton.

Mr. Rea said he had shifted his attention to Alberta because of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's "monopoly" policy on the B.C. lower mainland.

Youth Given Suspended Term On Knife Charge

BURNS LAKE.—A three-year suspended sentence was handed out to Joseph Henry Kachur, 19, in county court here held by Judge W. O. Fulton of Prince Rupert.

Kachur pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawfully possessing an offensive weapon, a spring-knife, for a purpose dangerous to public peace.

Judge Fulton said that in his opinion a prison sentence would probably have a bad effect on the youth.

Kachur will have to report to the RCMP once a month for the first year, once every two months the second year, and every three months the remaining year of the suspended sentence.

Should Kachur break the law in any month during the term of the sentence, it would become effective immediately.
