US General Held Hostage By Red Korean Prisoners

SEOUL (CP)—General Francis T. Dodd said today Communist prisoners held him a hostage for 78 hours on Konje Island, threatened to kill him, resisted United Nations troops and staged an island wide prison break.

But the general said he was convinced nevertheless the United Nations Command threats to use force had a decided effect in gaining release.

The general, speaking in a clear, strong voice, said the demands made by the POW's "are inconsequential" and "concessions granted by camp authorities were of 'minor importance'."

Dodd read a statement to the press after being held behind bars of secrecy for 48 hours. He seemed to be in good health. Newspapers were not permitted to ask questions when he finished his prepared statement.

Dodd said he had been well treated in the compound 76.

Mr. Muzzy Puts on Big Frown As Mr. Abel Pulls a Fast Ace

Technically, Mr. Abel's double of the six-no-trump bid was not so bad. He had stoppers in not one, but all three of the enemy's bid suits. In addition, his partner had put in a vulnerable overcall. But, of course, he should have considered that the overcall had been made by Mr. Muzzy and might not be sound.

Six hearts would have been a safer contract but Miss Brash's incredible luck held and she made six no trump by a good play plus the fact that Mr. Abel had only one spade.

The king of spades was opened and Miss Brash won with the ace. She led the jack of hearts, which was permitted to win. She continued with her last heart and Mr. Abel won with the ace. He returned the jack of clubs and Mr. Muzzy frowned mightily. Any fool, he thought, would have led back a spade.

Miss Brash won with the queen of clubs and surveyed her prospects. While she had only 11 quick winners, it appeared from the bidding and the play to date that Mr. Abel was short in the major suits. If he held his side's only stoppers in the minors, he was going to be on an immortal squeeze.

She therefore led to dummy's king of diamonds and started to run the rest of the hearts. Before the lead of the last heart, Mr. Abel was down to J 10 9 in clubs and Q 10 in diamonds. Miss Brash held A K 5 in clubs and A 8 in diamonds.

On the last heart Mr. Abel had a hopeless decision to make. Surely Miss Brash had the ace and another diamond so that to get down to the lone queen in that suit would permit dummy's jack to win the 12th trick.

He therefore shuffled a club, whereupon Miss Brash discarded her eight of diamonds. She won the last four tricks with the ace of diamonds and her now good clubs.

Five Succeed In First Aid Examinations

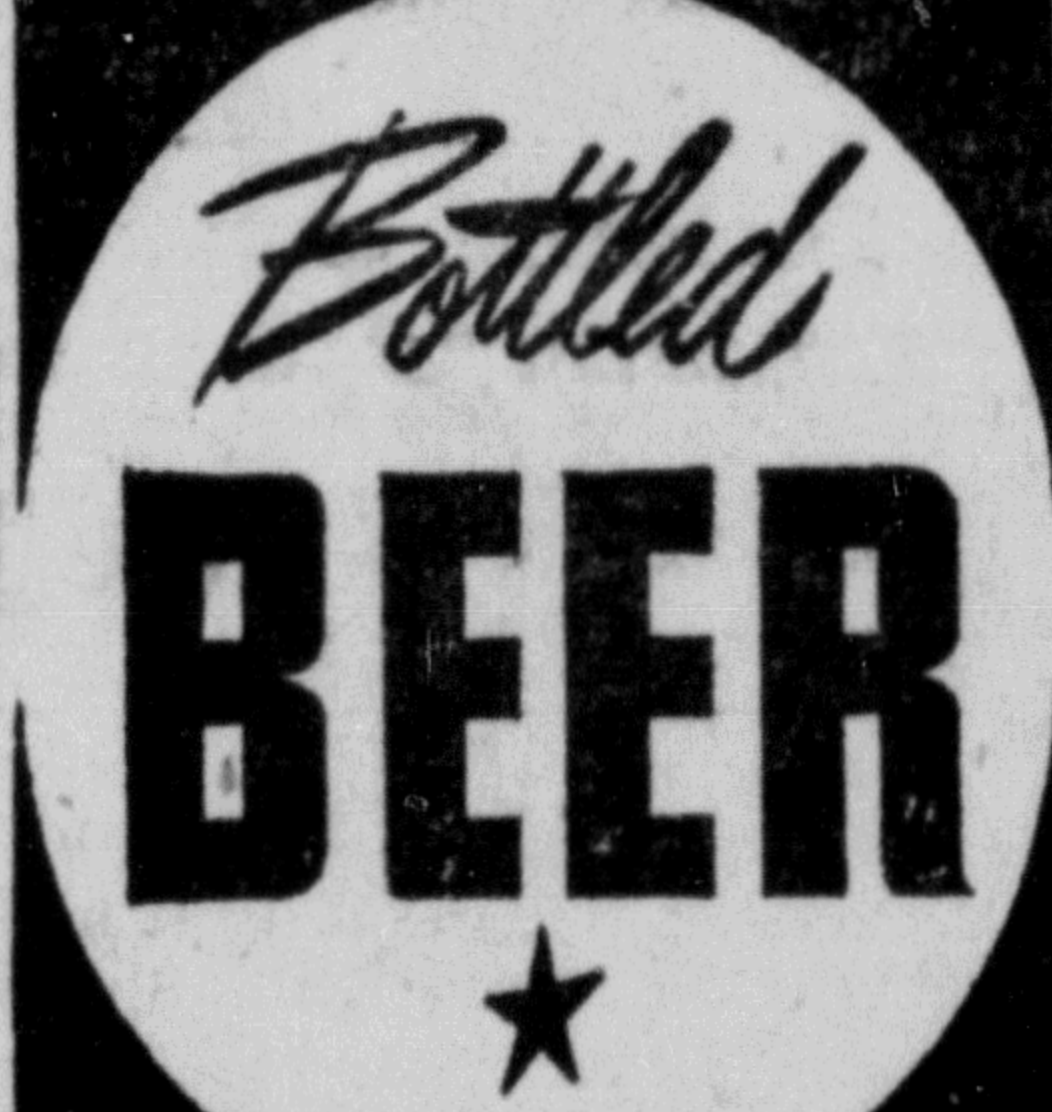
Five local candidates have passed their industrial first aid examination which they wrote in March, according to word received here. They were:

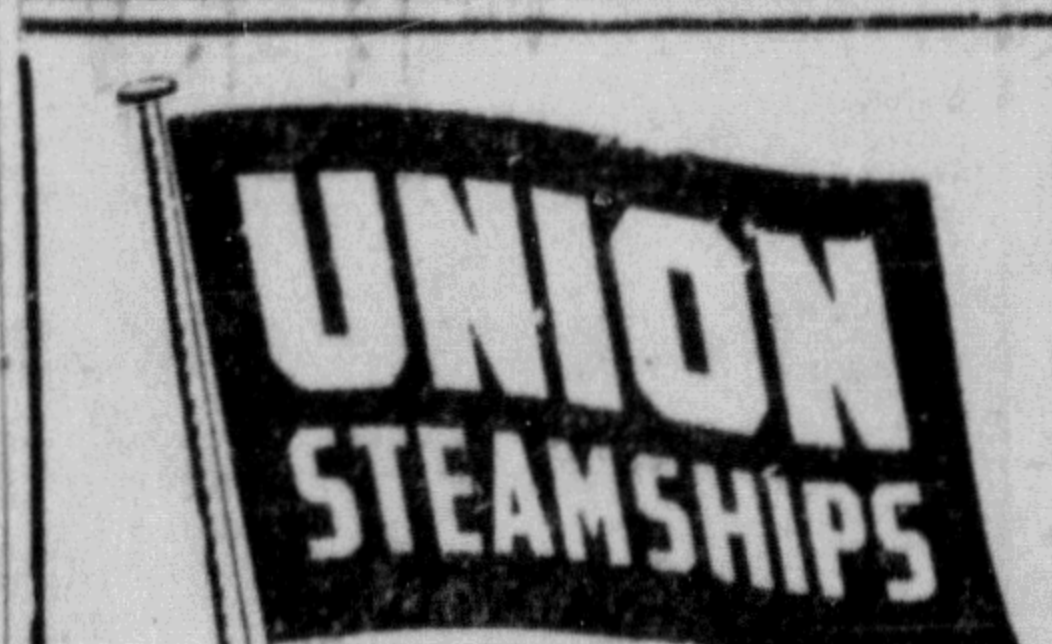

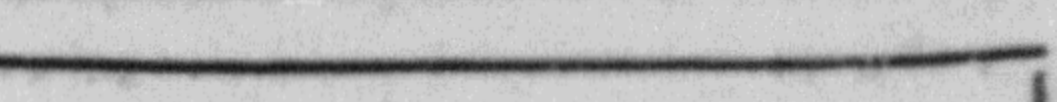
