Plans For Bulkley Valley Fair Launched

SMITHERS—Plans for a 1954
Bulkley Valley Fair were
launched at a meeting of the
executive committee of the Bulk-
ley Valley Agricultural and In-
dustrial Association here this
week.
Revival of the fair in 1953,

after a lapse of three years,
proved successful despite a brief
planning period.
Agriculturists at the session
termed the fair an opportunity
for district farmers to prove pro-
ductive capabilities of the area,
especially in view of the increas-
ing potential market for farm
produce at Kitimat, Prince Ru-
pert and in north-west B.C. gen-
erally.

The fair will be staged Wed-
nesday or Friday of Labor Day
week, and local businessmen will
be asked to approve a half-day
store closing if Friday is chosen.
The association planned to in-
crease value of prizes in all di-
visions, in a bid for more entries,
and a committee was appointed
to review the prize list and re-
port at the annual meeting,
planned for April 22.
