

Hotel Crew Continue Unbeaten Streak; Esquires, Terrace Split Doubleheader

He coasted through most of the game as his mates racked up 10 runs and nine hits off starter Christensen and one run and three hits off reliever Dunbar in the first five innings.

Hitting star of the day was Commercial Hotel left fielder Nick Pavlikis with four hits in five times to bat, scoring two runs and driving in two. The game was marred by errors with Commercial Hotel chalking up seven and G & A four.

Commercial lead the league with three wins and no losses; second are G & A with one and one, Esquires are third with one and two and Terrace with one and three, are in the cellar. But with 21 games to go for each club there will probably be

a scramble and fight for the league lead and a play-off berth. Esquires won the first game at Terrace 4-3 in the top of the ninth when Dell singled and came home on a double by Rosedale. It was a good game all the way.

Walcott Protest Rejected By Illinois Commission

CHICAGO — The Illinois Athletic Commission, voicing disappointment at Jersey Joe Walcott's showing against Rocky Marciano and urging his retirement, rejected a protest of the fight by the aged ex-champion's manager Monday.

There was little drama at the commission's hearing as chair-

man Livingston Osborne ruled that Marciano's knockout of Walcott in Chicago Stadium Friday night "stands as official" and all five points of a written protest are "disallowed."

Unless Felix Boechiechio, Walcott's manager, and his attorney, Angelo Malandra, decide to seek legal action against the decision in the courts, the case is closed.

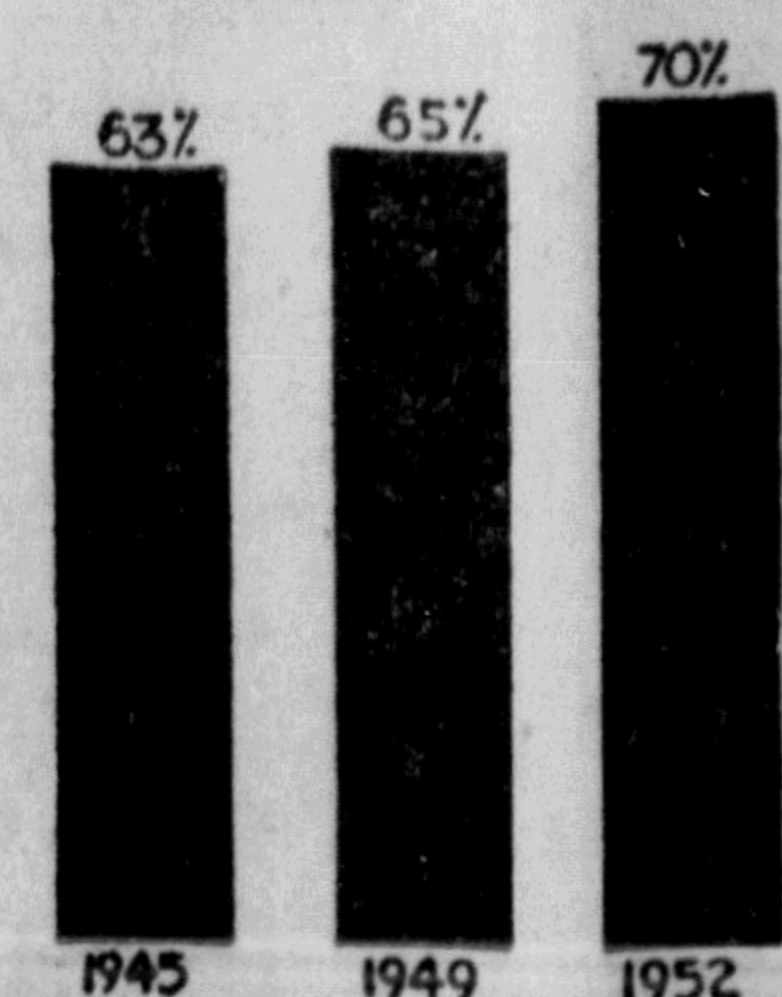
