

Need For Export Trade Expressed by Visitor

Britain's urgent need to export even though it is depriving her people of much-needed commodities was described last night by the new British Commissioner to Canada, Sir Archibald Nye, in an address sponsored by the Women's Canadian

League speaking to an audience that included the Canadian Legion and the Canadian Legion. Sir Archibald Nye described the circumstances that led to the last war which put Britain in a tight economic position. He pointed out that in shipping alone, the cost of the war was more than that of the whole of the world in 1939. It was necessary to sell all its investments to the extent of a billion dollars and a half billion dollars to pay for the war.

At least 85 per cent of the economy has been directed to achieve these objectives. He said that the products of our factories had to be sold in order to pay for the war.

export, and the figure is about the same for every other item. A further difficulty which followed the war, Sir Archibald observed, was the need for rearmament against the Communist threat. He said that today Britain has 880,000 men under arms in all parts of the world and remarked that the British "armored force" in Europe is greater than that of any other country, including the U.S.

Recalling that Britons were accused recently of being an idle race, the high commissioner said that while it was true that the rise of trade unionism has caused a reduction in the length of working hours, production has increased 50 per cent since before the war. He also pointed out that the average working time per man in British industry in 1951 was 45.6 hours per week, compared to 42 hours per week in Canada, and 40.5 hours per week in the U.S.A. for the previous year.

Sir Archibald emphasized that Britain cannot buy more Canadian goods until it has more dollars from sales to this country. He said the recent large order to buy B.C. salmon was made as a friendly gesture and there were no strings attached. He added, however, that if Canada needed tinplate to can the salmon, Britons hoped this country would buy it from them.

He refuted charges that the country was through or that the people were depressed. "Our head is high and our position improving," he said. "In general the prospect is becoming brighter but we are under no illusions. We do not stand with a beggar's bowl asking other people to give us things. We have asked for trade, not aid, and we must continue to strive for it."

Sir Archibald was introduced by Mrs. F. E. Anfield, president of the Women's Canadian Club. Thanks were expressed from the audience by Bill Smith.
