## Joe Adcock Slams Record Home Run

NEW YORK (AP)—Milwaukee's Joe Adcock hit a record 475-foot home run into the centre field bleachers at the Polo Grounds Wednesday to set the baseball world shaking about another Ruthian blast.

No player ever hit one into the Polo Grounds bleachers in a regular major-league game since the seats were built in 1923.

Schoolboy Rowe of Detroit did it in the practice game before a 1933 exhibition game and Luke Easter of Cleveland, then playing in a Negro league, also slammed the ball into those distant bleachers.

After Adcock's feat it was ironic that the Milwaukee club had to win the game on a wild pitch by knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm in the ninth, giving the Braves a 3-2 edge over the New York Giants.
