FERGUS, Ont. (CP)—The pump that supplies the water tower at the Canadian National Railways station here went on the blink. An electrician went to the pumphouse to investigate and found a skunk inside.

The electrician beat a retreat and wired the equipment superintendent in Toronto. The equipment superintendent wired the division superintendent at Stratford, who wired the station agent at Fergus. The station agent, who already had received inquiries from engineers wondering how to run their engines without water, sent for a section man.

The section man solved the problem with a brick.

1,100 Troops Heading For Korea Front

SEATTLE (CP)—A new major rotation turnover is underway for Canada's forces in Korea.

More than 1,100 soldiers are crossing the Pacific today, the biggest movement from this port for some months. They will relieve men who have had a year's service in Japan and Korea.

They sailed recently, military secrecy shrouding the actual departure day and the name of the United States Army troopship carrying them to the Far East.

The men will relieve units of the 25th Infantry Brigade in Korea.

Fire Destroys Machine Shop

HALIFAX (CP)—Fire destroyed the Halifax Shipyards machine shop Wednesday causing one million dollars' damage. The privately-owned shipyard, one of the city's largest industries, employed 200 workers in the machine shop.

There is no indication of how the blaze started in the big one-storey building.

LANGLEY, B.C. (CP)—Three Langley high school boys lowered the school flag to half mast to mark the death of Premier Stalin.

The unidentified grade 12 students were expelled by Principal Roy Mountain immediately following their noon-hour prank.

Eight Missing In Oil Tanker Fire, Blast

HALIFAX (CP)—At least eight persons, including a woman, are missing in the stormy Atlantic after a fire and explosion aboard the oil tanker Angy south of Newfoundland.

Search-and-rescue crews here said today the merchant ship Clairborne took aboard 28 other crew members, but said the captain, his wife, all mates, radio operator and three seamen are still missing.

The tanker caught fire and exploded 350 miles south of Newfoundland three days ago.

The fore part of the tanker broke away and it is possible the missing men might have been aboard that section.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

**Beware of Trap in Very
Simplicity of Today's Hand**

Today's hand is a simple one and most declarers would make the three no trump contract. Yet there is a trap in its very simplicity. The suits must be played in a certain order or there is no chance for nine tricks.

Mrs. Keen led the queen of clubs and Mr. Champion ducked automatically. He had to lose the lead once for sure and possibly twice. In other words, he had to knock out the ace of hearts and finesse against the king of diamonds before he had a chance to take enough tricks for his contract.

He let the queen of clubs win the first trip to shorten Mr. Meek in the club suit. The jack of clubs was led next and taken with the king.

Usually it is advisable to go after your longest suit at a no-trump contract, and in this deal that would be diamonds. But, putting good judgment ahead of "rules" (which is always the proper order of things), Mr. Champion led the four of hearts at the third trick. He realized the ace of hearts was the only possible quick entry which Mrs. Keen could have. It had to be knocked out first while Mr. Champion still had a club stopper.

Mrs. Keen ducked the heart lead and dummy's king won. Now, again, Mr. Champion had to time the play just right. He could not lead another heart because the defenders might win with the ace and lead a third round of the suit, setting themselves two more heart winners while they still had the king of diamonds.

After winning his heart trick Mr. Champion returned to his
