Church Head Coming Here

First Presbyterian Church here will have a visit on the coming Sunday from Rev. J. A. Munro, B.A., M.C., General Secretary of the Home Mission Board of Toronto, who will preach at both morning and evening services.

Mr. Munro originally intended to be in Prince Rupert in February which would have coincided with the forty-second anniversary of the calling of the late Rev. Dr. F. W. Kerr, the first inducted Presbyterian Minister in Prince Rupert, and also the twenty-seventh anniversary of the opening of the present church but pressure of work and the general inclemency of the weather at that time made it necessary to postpone his trip.

First Presbyterian service in Prince Rupert was held on the first Sunday in July, 1907, in the mess hall of the contractor building the wharf and was conducted by Rev. W. J. Kidd, B.A., B.D., of the Home Mission Board. Ever since so that the story of the Presbyterian Church in Prince Rupert has largely kept in line with the story of Prince Rupert. The church has seen its ups and downs as the fortunes of the community ebbed and flowed.

The late Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, a former highly esteemed minister, in a letter to a successor wrote: "When I read over my call I found it contained names of every creed, nation and tongue. It must have been the most cosmopolitan call ever extended to a minister."
