Openings For Hold-Up May Be Deceptive

It was this hand which prompted Miss Brash to suggest that the recent series on the hold-up play be followed with one on the subject of when NOT to hold up.

The hold-up occurs mainly at no trump contracts and its chief purposes are to cut the communications between the defenders' hands and to set the timing of the hand for a possible squeeze. It is useful, sometimes vital to the success of the contract.

But Miss Brash is right. There are occasions when the hold-up seems to be called for but, for various reasons, should not be used. For the next few days we'll look into these situations.

Today's hand illustrates the simplest case of all. Mr. Champion led the four of spades, Mr. Masters played the jack and Mr. New would have been better off if he had never heard of the hold-up. For a reason known only to him he let the jack win. He ducked the spade return and Mr. Champion won with the queen.

Now Mr. Champion hit on the killer. He led the five of diamonds. This put his partner in with the king to lead another spade. Mr. Champion now had the king of spades set up and this, with the ace of diamonds, was enough to beat the contract. Let's see how it would have gone if Mr. New had won the first spade trick as he should have done. At trick two he would lead a small diamond.

Mr. Masters would win and lead back a spade. Mr. Champion could take the king and queen but then he would be through. Mr. New's ten would win the fourth round of the suit. He would lose, in all, two spades and two diamonds.

He should have won the first trick, because using his ace to kill an opposing honor would guarantee him two spade winners. The way he played it, he got only one.
