American Prisoner Describes Red Efforts to Halt Talks

TOKYO (CP)—A United States soldier who returned to his countrymen after once rejecting them for communism said today the Red high command ordered him and 21 other Americans to break up Allied efforts to win them back.
 Cpl. Claude J. Batchelor of Kermit, Tex., said the Reds slipped instructions through a Communist-staffed hospital near the neutral-zone camp where the 22 pro-Red American POWs were held.
 He said the Reds ordered the Americans not to come out for Allied explanations. The Americans never did show for the interviews.
 Batchelor spoke at a crowded press conference in Tokyo army hospital. The 22-year-old corporal, who left the camp early New Year's Day, said "I made a mistake" in once believing the United States was the aggressor in Korea.
 However, he denied he had ever been an informer on fellow prisoners, and said he hoped he had not influenced anyone.
 "I'd like to get some of the other prisoners back." He said that several weeks before he left "I wanted to try to get some other men out"—but would not say why he failed.
 Meanwhile, his Japanese wife, Kyoko, worked on letters to three American men in the stockade near Panmunjom.
 "Claude says my letters decided him to come back," Kyoko said, "and maybe would help him to get his friends to come back, too."
 She said one of the three has a wife in the U.S., one a mother and one has no family. Batchelor asked her not to reveal the names.

Some See All Cards: Still Guess Wrong
 I know you have a Mr. Heinsite in your circle of players and I want to tell you some things about him. Here is the first. He is often wrong—even after he has seen all 52 cards.

Sometimes his faulty analysis goes unchallenged because it is apparently correct. But he seldom gets away with anything when old Mr. Dale is in the game.
 In today's deal Mr. Dale led his singleton heart against the four spade contract. Looking the situation over, Mr. Abel saw that he could win seven spades and two hearts. He had no tricks in the minors but if he could ruff one of his small hearts in dummy he would have the game made.
 At trick two he cashed the ace of trumps in the hope that, even if Mr. Dale had started with a lone heart, he also had only one spade. At trick three he laid down the ace of hearts. Mr. Dale ruffed, put Mrs. Keen in with the ace of diamonds and she promptly led the last trump off the board. Thus Mr. Abel managed to go down two, losing two hearts, a ruff, a diamond and a club.

Mr. Heinsite started in. "It's ice-cold for 10 tricks," he said authoritatively. "Just lead a small heart at trick two. Mrs. Keen will win and she can return a spade if she wants to. But you can win that and then lead your other small heart and ruff with my jack of spades. So you win seven spades and two hearts in your hand and a ruff in mine."
 Mr. Dale smiled. "I'll tell you another way he can make it," he said. "Lay down the king of diamonds and have Mrs. Keen duck."
 Mr. Heinsite frowned at him. "But that's absurd," he said. "No more than your analysis," Mr. Dale contended. "You want Abel to lead a small heart at trick two. All right, Mrs. Keen wins it and returns a trump. Abel wins and ruffs his other small heart. But now how does he get off the board? Dummy now has only clubs and diamonds left. On the lead of either suit, Mrs. Keen wins with the ace and fires another heart. I ruff it. So Abel doesn't win two heart tricks after all."

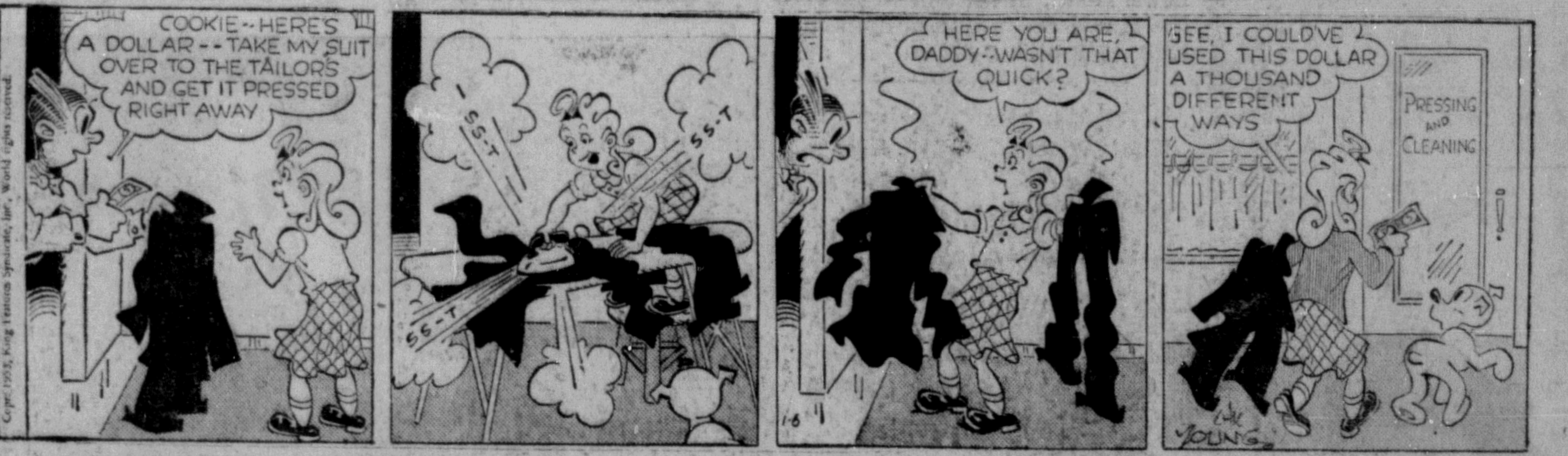
