Resources Development To Be Major Factor in Saskatchewan Elections

How to get rich by developing Saskatchewan's oil, gas and mineral resources is a dominant issue in the June 11 provincial election.

The CCF government says that during its two terms of office it has laid the foundation for fast development of natural resources. Private enterprise has been given every assurance its rights would be protected by the government.

Liberal Leader Walter Tucker, seeking to end his party's eight years in opposition, argues that as long as the CCF government remains in office the province's great potential wealth will never be tapped because business is afraid of its policies.

OTHER PLATFORMS

The Progressive Conservatives maintain the policies they advocate would bring money and people to the province. The Social Credit party promises industrial expansion and good clean government along the lines of what it maintains Alberta has.

Neither Progressive Conservatives nor Social Crediters have sufficient candidates in the field to form a government.

The CCF "Program for Progress" foresees an expanding economy guaranteed by the continuing development of gas, oil and mineral resources, and by steadily improving agricultural production. In a third term of government, it promises:

A \$75,000,000 highway and major road program; power for 40,000 farms and all towns and villages; natural gas in larger cities and intermediate points; construction of the South Saskatchewan river dam in co-operation with the federal government; reclamation and settlement of new northern areas; abolition of the public revenue tax by Dec. 31 next; assistance to municipalities on the basis of need; increased grants for education; extension of the medical care program and expanded social welfare benefits.

The Liberals are emphasizing a subsidized program of rural electrification, more financial help for municipal road building, payment of at least one-fifth of government oil royalties to land owners without mineral rights, and construction of "properly" built highways and bridges.

FREE ENTERPRISE

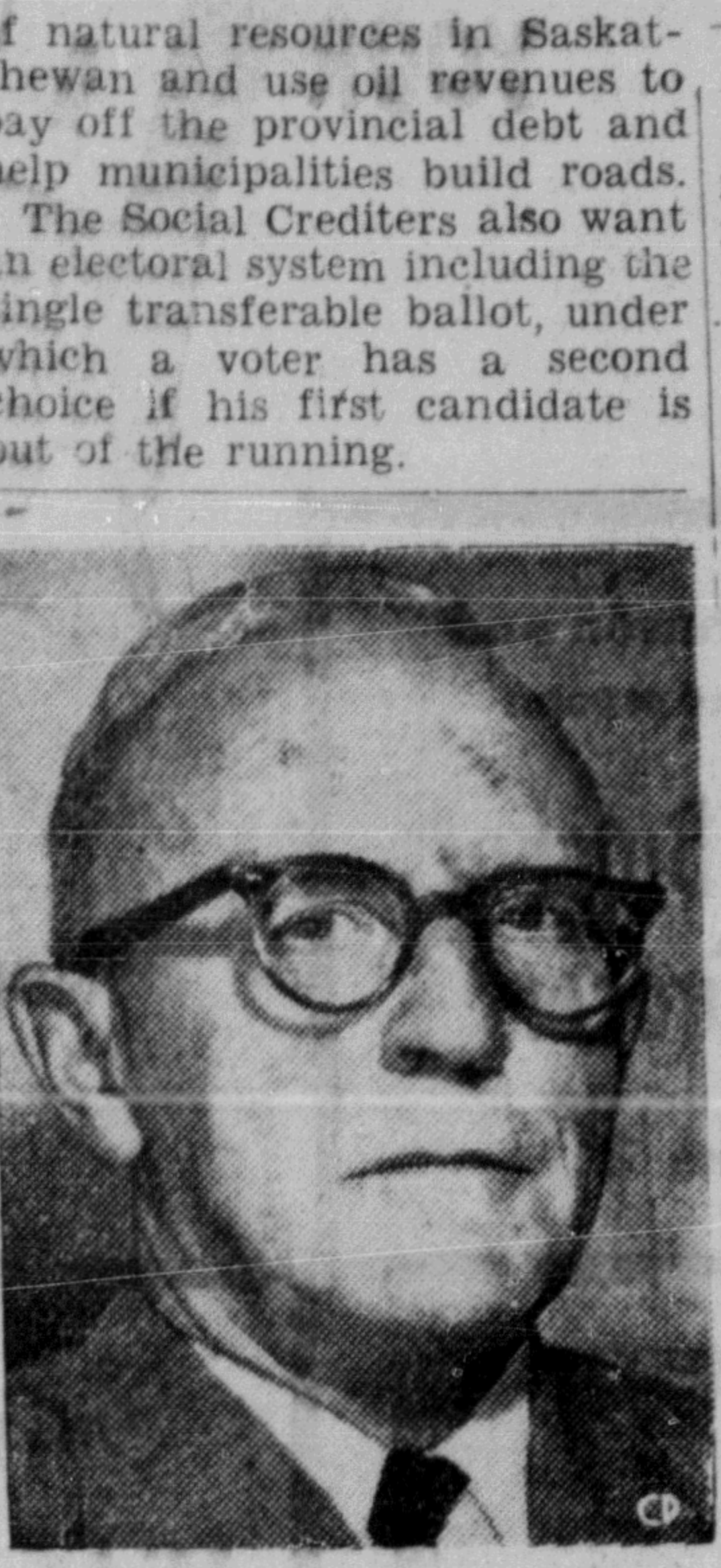
Liberal Leader Tucker says free enterprise must be encouraged. Higher wages and increased social welfare measures would follow if there were plenty of jobs and more development.

"The present government is wearing two faces," he said in his first major campaign speech at Moose Jaw. "On the one hand, it has begged and pleaded for industry to come here and yet it hasn't repudiated the socialistic Regina manifesto."

Projects in the Progressive Conservative program include development of the South Saskatchewan river scheme as a provincial responsibility, the Carrot river valley development, a conservation and soil utilization program, natural gas use for electric power, and provision of a percentage of crown mineral royalties to surface owners.

The Progressive Conservatives argue that social services in Saskatchewan have reached a point at which attention must be turned to development projects to support them.

Social Credit campaigners point to Alberta as proof that party policies promote major oil development. They promise to bring about similar development

men below. I went to call for medical help and then assisted as much as I could."

PLANS APPROVED

Richard Henderson, civil engineer with M.K., told the jury the ramp was built for getting passengers from the seaplane landing to the causeway.

His department had approved plans and he believed the ramp was strong enough to withstand a weight of 20,000 pounds. He estimated the weight of the ramp at 4,500 pounds.

In answer to Sgt. Potterton, he said he could not see any reason why the ramp would crash unless there was a flaw in the metal used to make the connecting links.

The doctor at Kemano who attended the injured, was unable to attend because of pressure of work, but his statement was read into the records. He told of aid given Mr. Hunter and said in his opinion death was caused by severe shock and numerous injuries.

The hearing then recessed briefly to visit the home of Jack McRae.

Mr. McRae, resting on a chertier, told how the party left here about 7 a.m. and after reaching Kemano had gone for a walk "to stretch our legs."

On the return, said Mr. McRae, I was slightly ahead of Mr. Hunter and Mr. Mager.

First Post War Class To Graduate From RMC Commission To Spend Millions On New Power

VICTORIA — British Columbia Power Commission will spend \$4,290,000 of its estimated six million dollar requirement for 1952-53 work program on completion of the John Hart Development, Campbell River.

An additional \$3,000,000 will be required for capital construction this year, says BCPC in a prepared release.

Other provisions in the generation field to be completed this year include diesel engines for Terrace and Quampan, and new power plants at St. James and Queen Charlotte City, the latter also to have installed an electric power distribution system.

OTTAWA — First graduation ceremonies in ten years will commence at Royal Military College May 31, when 72 cadets of the senior class receive their commissions.

Ceremonies will get under way on Saturday evening with an informal dance to be followed Sunday by a church parade and a picnic.

Defence Minister Brooke Claxton has been invited to present diplomas, commissions and prizes to graduating cadets of the first post-war class.

Invitations have been extended to many top military and civilian leaders including Lt.-Gen. Charles Foulkes, chairman of the chiefs of staff; Vice-Admiral E. R. Mainguy, chief of the naval staff; Lt.-Gen. G. C. Simonds, chief of the general staff and Air Marshal W. A. Curtis, chief of the air staff.

A graduation luncheon to be attended by the class and special guests, will complete the ceremonies on Tuesday.

A few weeks ago, the graduating class held the traditional passing-out parade during which the fourth year class passed over its seniority to the third year class.
