'Walking Bomb' Gets 7 Years In Prison
SUDBURY, Ont. (C)—Termed a "walking bomb" by Magistrate W. J. Golden, Peter Max, 31, was sentenced to a total of seven years in penitentiary.
Arrested February 21, Max was carrying a loaded pistol, two jars of nitro-glycerine, electric detonating caps, wires and batteries, rubber gloves, a screw driver, flashlight and a box of ammunition.
Max was sentenced to two years for carrying the gun and five years consecutive to the other sentence for having the nitro-glycerine. He was given 30 days concurrent for having an unregistered gun. A fourth charge of possessing housebreaking tools was withdrawn.
"You were a walking bomb, a potential mass murderer," the magistrate said. "If you had slipped or fallen you could have touched off a blast that could have injured a number of innocent citizens."


