## Saturday Sermon

*My People Love To Have It So*

A man was heard to say of a friend of his youth, "I lost touch with him. I became a Sunday School teacher and he became interested in politics and we drifted apart."

This has become such a disease in our society that it has now become a part of the life of thousands of years ago when there was one god of the soil and

another of the desert. The god of wisdom is quite different from the god of wine. If a man wants to marry he must pray at one temple; if he wants to make war he must take his sacrifice elsewhere. We turn to another department of life called politics. Now we think in quite different terms. Our liturgy is the catchwords of the daily press. Our divine revelation is the news broadcast. Our creed is "I believe in democracy." Our incentive is the fear of—we're not sure what. But it isn't fear of the Lord.

Therefore do we have political platforms which have to do solely with payrolls, insurances and debt structures. We have school teachers, lawyers, merchants, builders and so on who know nothing and care less about wider purposes of human society and spend all their time and thought in efficient operation of their own particular department and the economic returns therefrom. And all of them want to push the parson into a corner and tell him that religion is his business and nobody else's.

For if we cannot all meet around the feet of God, there can be no such thing as community. To a roiling Jerusalem, He said with tears, "How often would I have gathered thee, as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wing, and ye would not."

And can you really feel so smug and complacent about all that happens in this fair town of Prince Rupert that all that concerns you is your economic security and your amusements?

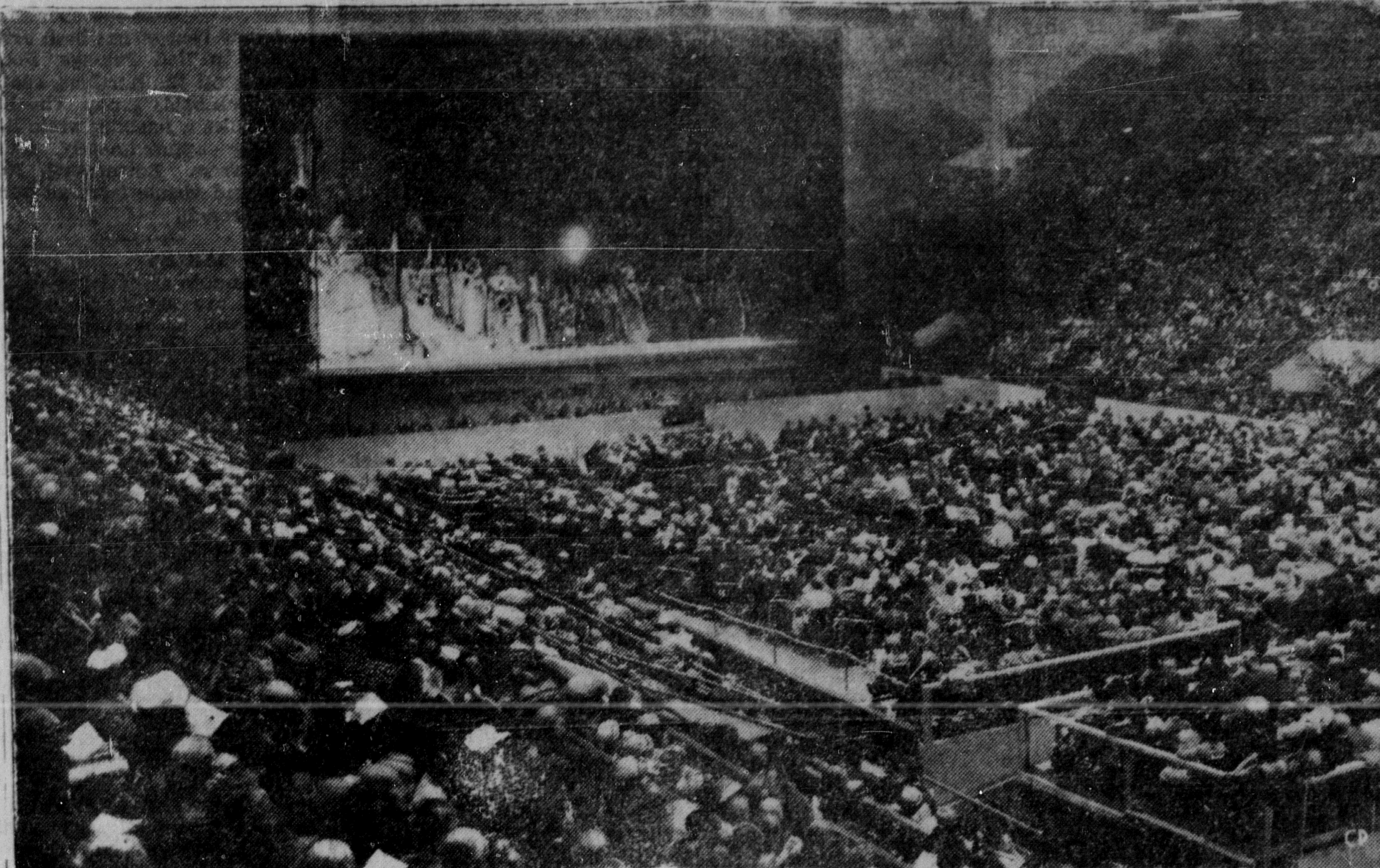

## Salvation Army Plans "Operation 70" Campaign

"Operation 70" is an evangelistic campaign which will be launched tonight by Col. and Mrs. J. Tyndall, Salvation Army, Vancouver. Services will commence at the Fraser Street Citadel and will continue Sunday and each night until Thursday.

Col. and Mrs. Tyndall have a wealth of successful experience through the many years of active leadership in India and in Canada. The Colonel will develop, throughout the campaign, the theme of "The Plan of Redemption."

Mrs. Tyndall will conduct a public women's rally in the Citadel Tuesday afternoon. She was for 11 years secretary for the Army's League of Mercy work in Canada. This league, of Salvation Army personnel, visits hospitals, prisons and other institutions.

"What people ask for more and more today," Dr. Bell told the Advertising Association at its annual conference, "is information and argument."

Dr. Bell appealed to advertisers not to play upon people's passions or their worst instincts.

"Don't play fast and loose with the deepest things in order to commend your commodities. Don't be so fascinated by the possibilities of technique that you ignore all moral considerations and lose your own soul."

The commission, which has been taking evidence for several months, received the proposal in a memorandum from the National Association for Mental Health.

At present the law says that a divorce can be given on cruelty grounds only "if it is proved that the cruelty leads to a breakdown in health. The association suggested the law might be extended to a further category under some such heading as 'persistent abnormal behaviour'."

Besides nagging and disparagement, the memorandum urged that behaviour which made respect, affection and trust between the partners impossible should be included. Under this heading also should be perversion, alcoholism, persistent adultery and irresponsibility and concealed extravagance.

On the question of reconciliation, the association said that if all cases had to go through matrimonial courts before reaching the divorce courts, much might be done to mend marriages on the verge of disruption.

"It seems reasonable to suggest establishment of family courts which could consider all legal matters affecting the family, including petitions for divorce," the memorandum added. "In such a court the interests of the children might more readily find a hearing."

## Platter Parade

A terrific new voice is coming up fast into the ranks of top male vocalists. This one-man invasion came about on the strength of one record made for a small diskery and has just earned the singer, Al Martino, a contract with Capitol Records. Martino, the first boy singer to cause any flurry in the night club and record trade since Johnnie Ray, will get much the same build-up Ray received when he first started.

Martino's song is on the BBS label and is called "Here In My Heart." The Canadian release is on Quality Records. Both the song and singer are sure to reach the top.

Tony Bennett (Col.), Vic Damone (Mer) and Dick Haymes and the Andrews Sisters (Decca) have also done the song with the closest to Martino's in popularity being the Tony Bennett version.

Mercury Records was given the okay sign about playing the Richard Hayes recording of "Junco Partner." Research was done on the Junco title coming up with the Cajun translation meaning "worthless man." Banning of the tune was brought about when it was believed the lyrics referred to the use of narcotics. The U.S. Narcotics Agency has given a clearance to the Hayes version, as well as to several other disks.

**Forecast of Future Record Hits**—"I'm Sorry," a pleasant new ballad by Dick Haymes and the Andrews Sisters (Decca) and Bobby Wayne (Mercury); "I'm Confessin'" and "Carolea," follow up to their smash hits "Tiger Rag" by Les Paul and Mary Ford (Capitol); "Walkin' My Baby Back Home," taken from the top selling Johnnie Ray album (Columbia) and "Here In My Heart," by Al Martino (Quality) and Tony Bennett (Columbia).

The Four Aces, sparked by lead singer Al Alberts, do a strong job on the lovely new ballad "I'm Yours." Overseas the oldie, "I Understand," shows off the group's strong beat and slick harmony.

"Like a nice ballad by a lovely singer? If so, listen to Rosemary Clooney's Columbia etching of "Half As Much." Keep your eye on this one, for it could easily be headed for the top. Other side,

## On the BOOK SHELF

"My SON'S STORY" by John P. Frank. (Available at Wm. Earl Sargent Memorial Library.)

The simple dignity of this remarkable human document will be of profound interest to parents, even if their children are spared the tragedy that struck the Frank family.

Peteey was a handsome child but he did not develop normally. He was found to have cortical atrophy, the consequences of which leave a child little more than a vegetable.

At first the Franks were determined to take care of Peteey at home. Good friends, including two supreme court justices, persuaded them to institutionalize Peteey. Mr. Frank carefully advances the reasons for and against this step and his book performs a great service for those confronted by a similar situation.

No less valuable is Mr. Frank's informed report of the institutions investigated. The Franks, who are not Catholics, eventually discovered that only a Catholic institution could help them. The closing section is a fine tribute to St. Rita's near Buffalo, where Peteey still lives.

John P. Frank is a teacher of law at Yale. Here is Mr. Frank's own version of the book.

"This is a book about my son, who is sick in a terrible way." Why publish it? he asks. His answer has three parts.

FIRST—the American people ought to know more about an almost unknown yet common tragedy in their midst. If they know, they can do a great deal to improve the handling of it.

SECOND—certain people, doing a magnificent if lonely job trying to meet the situation now,
