quity, power to force witnesses to answer questions. If they answer, said Mr. Patenaude, they may incriminate themselves. If they refuse to answer they can be held in contempt and fined or sentenced to jail.

His aim, he said, is not to block the inquiry but to obtain protection of the liberty of the individual. There should be some means of protecting witnesses before they testify. Now they could have recourse to the courts only after they had incriminated themselves or after they had been held in contempt.

Ronald Halpin, counsel for sponsors of the inquiry, disagreed with Mr. Patenaude. Witnesses, if they asked for it, could obtain the protection of the Canada Evidence Act. The act would protect the witness against use of their testimony in any subsequent criminal proceedings.

Mr. Halpin said the Quebec Court of Appeals had been right in quashing injunction issued by Mr. Justice Cousineau. The judge had exceeded his powers in issuing the injunction.

WATERFRONT -- WHIFFS

All Quiet on the 'Front

Activity on the waterfront was almost at a standstill this morning as only one halibut boat reported in from the fishing grounds.

The lone boat, the JR, brought in 6000 pounds to the Fishermen's Co-operative. No boats reported to the exchange.

Exchange officials, however, are prepared for a heavy catch on Monday morning with closure of halibut fishing at midnight Sunday.

The season opened May 14. Quota for the season was 25-500,000 pounds.

TOURIST SEASON

Every spring you hear repeated the not unfamiliar assurance that this "is going to be the best tourist summer seen yet." Sometimes the listener gives a warming smile, a vigorous head nodding and a hearty "You bet."

And there are a few who sniff and just pass along.

But it's not that way this week-end. Steamships large and little, and practically all crowded, keep coming and going, and no one can be found who has his doubts about the summer's business. Nothing is more natural than that this should be the situation. For this is a magic coast, and the only reason millions, instead of thousands, are not cruising these enchanted

waters is lack of service and facilities.

HALIBUT SEASON

It's been a brief but a reasonably prosperous halibut season. Today, it's perilously close to the end of 1952, which is June 8, and that's tomorrow, so the quota is near.

If catches in this area have not been uniformly heavy, they have been pretty close to it. One of the chief reasons could be called the spells of cold and tempestuous weather. For a while at first, the daily totals classed in the million bracket

and on the whole there has not been much reason for serious complaint.

A new beacon has been established in Bell Passage, Hecate Straits, on the northern islet of the Archibalds group. The beacon shows a flashing white light bearing approximately south-southwest from Butterworth Rock buoy and visible from all points of approach.

MORE BARLEY

Shipments of barley at Prince Rupert are about to resume. There will be two vessels coming to load, the first being due early in the week and the next a week later. Each will carry 450,000.

Once an American tug chaser and now converted into a towing craft, the Nanaimo Chief, changed and improved in many important respects, is now being used for general towing purposes in coastal waters. She has a log towing capacity of 48 sections. She has all diesel auxiliaries fitted with radio telephone. Her crew numbers seven.

Glass panels are being fitted into the bottom plates of a number of British warships to assist naval scientists with under-water investigations. This is an experiment and is concentrated on the effects of the water flowing past the hull of a vessel. Workers say they hope their studies will lead to changes in propeller designs and greater driving thrusts.

The two 65-foot seiners under construction in Sterling Yards in Vancouver are expected to be launched in July. Housework can be said to be practically completed, and installation of machinery and general equipment will shortly be placed.

Police Seize Faqs

PALERMO, Sicily (Reuters) — Armed customs police yesterday seized several million contraband American cigarettes landed at dawn on the coast near here. The police ambushed a convoy of two trucks and 10 farm carts while seven men were loading one consignment of 3,000,000 cigarettes, which had just been brought ashore in small boats.
