

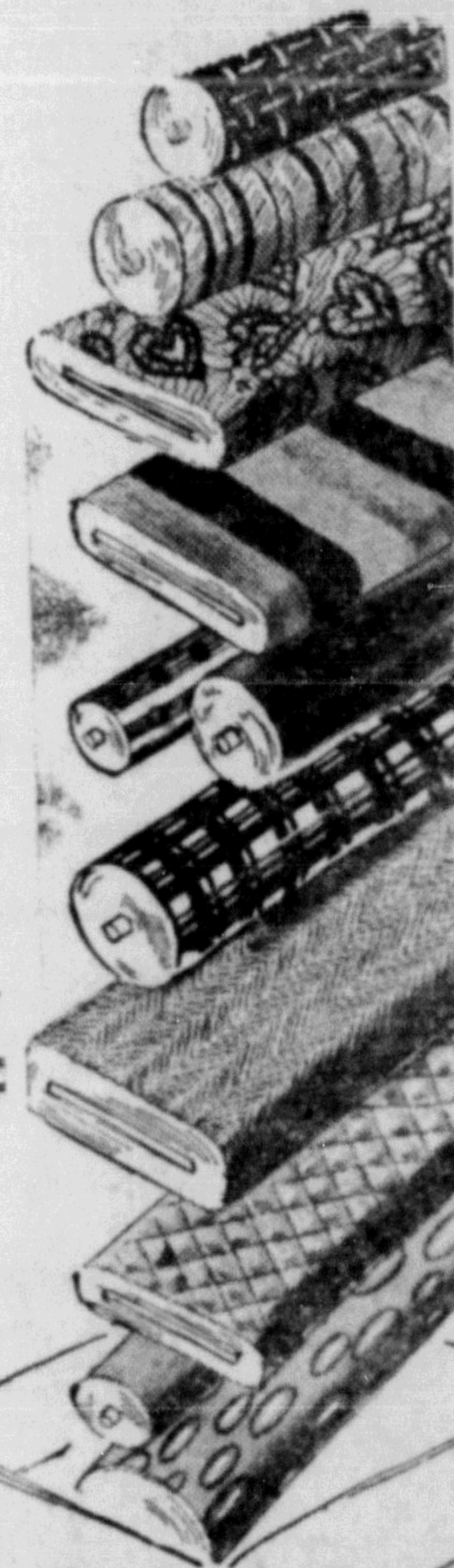

Court Urges Stiffer Terms

VICTORIA (CP)—The five-member court of appeal of British Columbia has advocated stiffer maximum penalties for drug traffickers.



MICHAEL BARKWAY, Ottawa correspondent for the Financial Post, was criticized in the House of Commons for a broadcast over the CBC in which he commented on the controversial Currie report.

The court's view was outlined in a judgment of Chief Justice Gordon Sloan.

At present the maximum penalty for those convicted of distributing or selling narcotics is seven years. The code also provides for fines and whippings.

Chief Justice Sloan proposes increased penalties for offenders who had engaged in selling drugs for profit.

The court drew a distinction between offenders in the no-profit-motive class and those selling for gain.

Car Selling System Gains In Popularity

VICTORIA (CP)—The provincial government's new system of selling cars to civil servants is gaining in popularity.

An official of the provincial purchasing commission said more than 100 civil servants have purchased government cars since the plan was instituted last September.

Pending sales number 20, and 25 other applications are being considered.

Employees who use government cars in their work can buy vehicles by paying outright cash, or by a system of monthly instalments. Minimum payment is \$50 monthly.

Police Plan Crackdown On 'Lotteries'

VANCOUVER (CP)—Police are mapping plans for a crackdown on what they say are lotteries operated by business firms, radio stations and theatres.

Assistant prosecutor Stewart McMoran said no charges have yet been laid but that he has under consideration a charge against a taxi firm.

Spokesman for Yellow, Star and Checker Taxi Company, which gives away numbered tickets, some of which are drawn for weekly prizes, said the firm will fight any attempt to classify the procedure as a lottery under the criminal code.

Ship Disaster Claims Kin Of B.C. Logger

VANCOUVER (CP)—After two days of worrying, a Butedale logger learned that his brother-in-law and his old ship perished in the Irish Sea Saturday.

Gordon Stewart walked into a Vancouver newspaper office to inquire who was lost on the Princess Victoria, the Scotland-Northern Ireland ferry that sank with loss of 130 persons.

He found that his life-long friend, Capt. James Ferguson, who married his sister 28 years ago, went down with his ship.

Mr. Stewart sailed on the Princess Victoria for five years and remembers Capt. Ferguson as "a fine, brave sailor and an awfully good fellow."

Mr. Stewart's sister and brother-in-law had planned to come to Vancouver for a holiday.

Flood Payments

REGINA (CP)—Rehabilitation payments covering flood damage in Saskatchewan last spring exceeded \$150,000, reports John Probe provincial civil defence coordinator. The biggest share, more than \$120,000, was to restore buildings damaged at East-end.
