VANCOUVER ( -- Police are mapping plans for a crackdown on what they say are lotteries operated by business firms, radio stations and theatres

Assistant prosecutor Stewart McMorran said no charges have vet been laid but that he has under consideration a charge against a taxi firm.

Spokesman for Yellow, Star and Checker Taxi Company, which gives away numbered tickets, some of which are drawn for weekly prizes, said the firm will fight any attempt to classify the procedure as a lottery under the criminal code.

At present the maximum penalty for those convicted of distributing or selling narcotics is seven years. The code also pro-

vides for fines and whippings. Chief Justice Sloan proposes increased penalties for offenders who had engaged in selling drugs for profit.

Pending sales number 20, and 25 other applications are being considered.

Employees who use government cars in their work can buy vehicles by paying outright cash, or by a system of monthly instalments. Minimum payment is \$50


