

Red Wings Make History in Winning Stanley Cup Series

DETROIT.—Detroit Red Wings made hockey history last night in winning the Stanley Cup by defeating Montreal Canadiens in four straight games.

It was the first time the Stanley Cup had been won in eight straight play-off games. They had won four straight in the semi-finals from Toronto Maple Leafs which qualified them to meet the Canadiens in the final.

The heroic Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk equalled the record of

four play-off shut-out victories. It was the second Stanley Cup for Detroit in three years. It is their fifth Stanley Cup win and their fifth National Hockey League championship.

Metro Prystai was hero of the game, scoring two goals and assisting Glen Skov with the third.

Dodgers and Indians Win

Pre-season Favorites Get Off To Good Big League Start

NEW YORK.—Brooklyn and Cleveland, pre-season pennant favorites, got off to a winning start on Tuesday as the 1952 baseball season got under way.

Cold, blustery rains prevented the defending champions, New York Giants and Yankees, from playing but all other teams managed to get in their first games despite chilly, dismal weather.

The opening day proved a jinx to home clubs as all five hosts went down to defeat.

The Dodgers began their bid for the National League flag by shading the Braves in Boston 3-2. The Indians also moved in the right direction in quest of the

American League title, beating the White Sox in Chicago by the same 3-2 score.

Boston's Red Sox proved ungracious guests, shutting out the Senators 3-0 in Washington before President Truman and 25,869 less distinguished patrons. Rogers Hornsby's revamped St. Louis Browns embarrassed home town Detroit Tigers before Queen Juliana of the Netherlands and 43,112 cash customers, blanketing the Bengals also by 3-0 count.

Chicago's Cubs had to wait ten innings but got the deciding run on Gene Hermanski's pinch hit single to eke out a 6-5 victory over the Reds in Cincinnati before 25,517 blanketed and over-coated fans.
