

# Enrolment at UBC Low Ebb This Year

Most of the students pouring into Canadian universities this month are finding living accommodations and registering in their preferred courses not too much trouble.

Living costs while attending college are highest in Toronto, where a student can get campus accommodation for \$15 a week but pays up to \$20 if he rooms and boards in a private home. Edmonton runs a close second in living costs, which average \$60 a month.

At the universities of British Columbia and Saskatchewan students pay \$55-\$60 a month and in New Brunswick they can find good quarters for as low as \$12 a week.

In all colleges, arts and science courses are generally the most popular, especially with women. Engineering is still chosen by many men.

## FIRST-YEAR CHANGES

The University of British Columbia expects enrolment of 5,400, about the same as last year. Officials say attendance is at a "low ebb" and put the blame on the fact "depression-year babies" now are entering university and their numbers are lower than those born in the 20s.

There's a long waiting list for women's quarters on the campus, but ample accommodation for both men and women away from the university. For the first time this year, UBC is enrolling high school graduates who have had only two instead of three years of languages, which is causing some changes in first-year courses.

More than half the students are enrolled in arts and science courses leading to bachelor of arts degree. This year the university will graduate its first class of medical students, which numbers 60.

## Synod Fails To Name New Bishop

WILLIAMS LAKE, B.C. (CP)—A special election synod of the Church of England to name a bishop for the Cariboo diocese was adjourned Wednesday night after 50 delegates were unable to reach a final conclusion. With the election of a bishop delayed, delegates approved a resolution to reconvene again at a date and place to be set by Ven. Archdeacon C. H. R. Radshaw, administrator of the Cariboo diocese, in consultation with the diocese executive. Chairman of the meeting was Rev. Harold E. Sexton, Metropolitan Archbishop of British Columbia.

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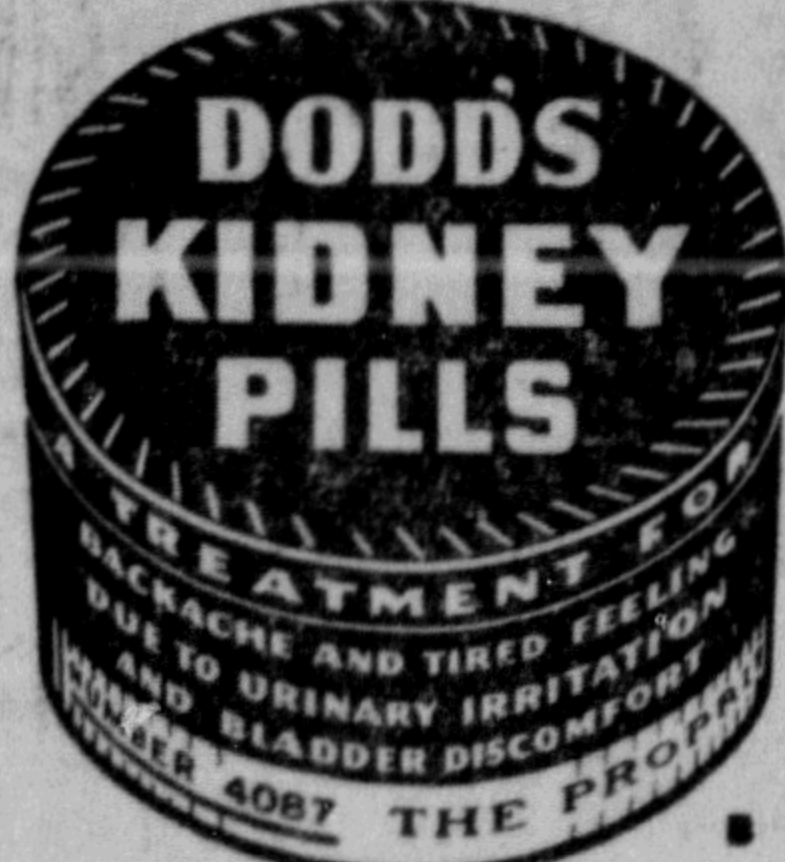

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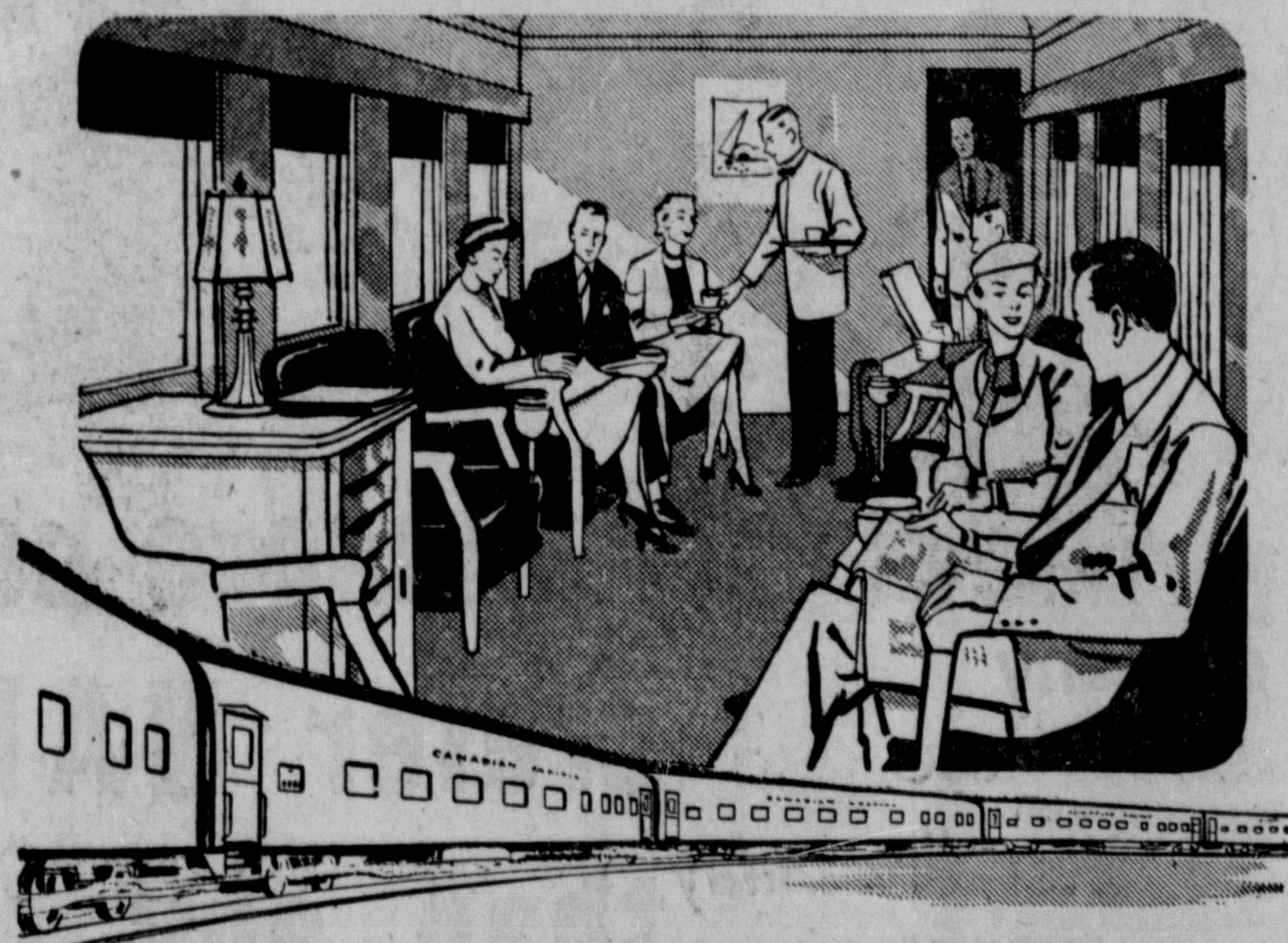
